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
The Headmaster's Review of the Week

Dear Bedian family,

As I write to you I am experiencing mixed emotions following my attendance at the U15 Plate Final of the Independent Schools National Netball Tournament which took place on Thursday of this week at Belle Vue Sports Village. Our heroic team lost 39-25 in a keenly fought contest and, although disappointed for all of those involved whether playing or coaching, I am incredibly proud of our pupils' achievement to finish 2nd in a national competition which originally had around 150 schools entering. I am sure that the girls will go from strength to strength over the coming years and I would like to congratulate all of those involved in such a fantastic cup run this year. As you might have expected, the Netball squad are retrospectively the College's "Team of the Week" and a surprise is in store for them next week in order to celebrate this accolade!

The College's theme this week is "Bearing Fruit", though it could be argued that it is the permanent theme for all of us who are involved, whether as teaching or support staff, in the education of young people. We have all heard the words "Give me another chance!" and most of us are able to feel pity for and offer forgiveness to someone who has expressed sorrow

The boys played exceptionally well and I understand it is the first time that St. Bede's have beaten Wright Robinson College at football in any age group for six years. Many congratulations to all of the pupils and staff involved, and I very much look forward to attending both finals if I am able to.

I really enjoyed meeting a large number of Prep 6 parents and pupils at the annual "Meet the SLT" event, which was held in the Joseph Refectory on Tuesday after school. The numbers of pupils entering Year 7, both internally and externally, for this coming September is looking very positive indeed and it is always a great pleasure for me to spend time with our inspiring Prep pupils and their wonderful families. It has also been a privilege for me to speak at and give out awards at several Celebration Assemblies this week and I pointed out that we are essentially celebrating the many ongoing achievements of all of the pupils and students here at the College, and we continue to be very proud of all of them.

Wednesday was another busy day at the College, with a group of L6th students visiting the Oxbridge information conference held at Aintree Racecourse – I understand that the trip was a highly informative one. During the lunch break that day I very much enjoyed my opportunity to act as a judge on the "Bede's Got Talent" event and I was struck by the extremely high quality of all of the acts. Well done to all of those who took part, thank you to Mr Lee Rodriguez and Mr Yates for their prominent roles in organising the event, and congratulations to Amarachi and Jeanne (both in U3) on winning the competition. Their rendition of "Halo" by Beyoncé was simply fantastic!






We must challenge ourselves to see if our life is bearing fruit or just bringing others down.





to refine and sharpen key examination techniques for the students ahead of their forthcoming summer examinations.


Our students maintained pace for the four hour duration by completing theoretical revision tasks, data interpretation and analytical development of written essays.

Once on our VIP bus home, they reflected on their fabulous day and there was much consensus that they were coming back to school from the "Best Trip Ever!!"

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
AJIS Netball Success

Marvellous Mathematicians!

Almost one thousand six hundred United Kingdom Primary and Prep Schools took part in this year's Primary Mathematics Challenge, a national competition organised by the Mathematical Association. The children are set twenty five problem questions which become increase in difficulty throughout the test.

Following the initial round in November, two thousand, three hundred and seventy-five individual pupils from the schools were invited to participate in the Final Round in February. This included ten of our Prep pupils, eight from Prep 6 and two from Prep 5.

One thousand, four hundred and ninety-six awards were allocated, consisting of: 103 Gold Medals, 657 Silver Medals and 736 Bronze Medals.



St Bede's pupils excelled gaining more gold and silver awards than any other independent school in the North West. This is the third consecutive year that our pupils have performed brilliantly in this prestigious national competition.



On Wednesday morning, the Sixth Form students welcomed Dan Newport to the College.

Newport gave the pupils an exciting talk on his chosen profession of architecture, and the ways in which it shapes life around us. The architect discussed how buildings can be the focal points of cities and although we may not realise, buildings are incredibly important as to how we operate as a society.

Newport showed students examples of how buildings can generate tourism and stimulate investment in cities, such as the 'Gherkin' building in London, which has become a notorious landmark in recent years.



From showing students the history of architecture, he also gave insightful information about the day-to-day life of an architect and how exciting the planning of buildings is, as well as the pitches to potentially clients. Whilst showing the highlights of being an architect, Newport did not shy away

from discussing the less attractive aspects. He discussed the course duration of seven years and how highly competitive it is to gain entry.

Through his talk, Newport allowed students to think about the daily impacts that buildings have on our lives, from our comforting homes to the luxury of hotels, the design of buildings is essential to how we operate as a society.

Many students were excited to listen to the talk, as it is one of the more attractive potential careers amongst pupils. As one student stated 'I found the talk really interesting, it gave me a realistic image of what lies in store for me if I choose to be an architect.' Another student stated, 'it was really insightful, I never really thought about how much buildings have an impact on our lives.'
