


Going for Gold


Theme of the Week


Medical Careers Day

The U12 football team put the disappointment of a cup final defeat behind them, to win a prestigious tournament at MGS.

Twenty-four teams competed and the draw for the U12s saw them up against Wright Robinson, Barlow, Cheadle Hulme HS, Kings Chester and Crompton House in the group stage. Here the boys won every game without even conceding a goal. The first match against Cheadle Hulme HS brought a 2-0 win with goals from Benat and Harry O. The second game produced an even more impressive victory with a 3-0 win over Kings Chester, with goals from Kwame, Justin and Benat. Wins against Barlow (1-0 Kwame), Crompton House (2-0 Benat, Harry O) and Wright Robinson (1-0 Benat) meant the U12s won their group and headed into the knockout stages full of confidence.

The quarter finals saw them paired with Stockport Grammar and a tight

game ensued, which finished 0-0. St Bede's progressed in a penalty shoot out. Another 0-0 draw in the semi against Lymm HS resulted in another shootout, with goalkeeper Dominic both scoring and saving.

Almost inevitably St Bede's would meet their old rivals MGS in another final in the space of two days. The boys played superbly in the final showing composure on the ball, aggression and great communication to restrict MGS to only one meaningful chance where Dominic pulled off





a great save. The MGS keeper was in fine form and thwarted both Benat and Padraig to ensure the game finished goalless. Penalties it was, Benat, Dominic, William and Harry 0 scored and a superb save from Dominic meant St Bede's would defeat MGS and bring the trophy back to the College. Football Update


On Saturday, eight teams took to the field against Kings Chester, both home and away.

A tweet was sent out highlighting how much had been collected and 'Save The Children' replied thanking them for their wonderful donation.









Their performances were absolutely amazing. The girls scored 50 goals without conceding one. This is a record for St Bede's in Hi-Five Netball. The results were as follows:



On Wednesday, a handful of sixth form students got the opportunity to visit Theodore House, a newly opened retreat centre at Stonyhurst College.

As we decanted from the minibus there was some scepticism. However upon entering the atrium we were blown away by the beauty of the place; modern design expertly intertwined with the traditional exterior of the renovated mill house.

We enjoyed opening prayers before continuing with the ALPHA course videos and were lucky to have Daniella, a recent theology graduate and Catholic speaker, joining us. She and Mrs Hibbert demonstrated the gift of 'speaking in tongues' – a phenomenon that some were wary of at first but were all grateful to experience in the end.



That evening we met with Miss Hanley, the Chaplain at Stonyhurst College, who kindly gave up her time to show us around the school. We were amazed by the grandeur of the building, including several stunning chapels, and hearing of their intense school day made us suddenly grateful for ours – the compulsory daily sport did not appeal!
