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


Jesus' Mission Statement

All Aboard

Last Friday, Mr Parker's Geology class and Mrs Todd's Geography class were given a real treat, as they hopped aboard the JOIDES Resolution research vessel (by video link, of course!) The JOIDES Resolution is a seagoing research vessel that drills core samples and collects measurements from under the ocean floor, giving scientists a glimpse into Earth's development.

The 50 scientists and technicians collect a wide range of data, from rock samples and fossils, to identifying the size and location of mantle plumes, so this was a fantastic opportunity for our students to talk to

people at the forefront of scientific and geological research. Each expedition lasts for two months and the crew onboard the JR are currently half way through a trip exploring the Walvis Ridge, located over 1000km west of Namibia, in the Atlantic Ocean.

Students were lucky enough to be given their very own guided tour of the vessel by three of the crew, Maya, Sonia and Kevin. The ship is 144 metres long, 21 metres wide and has a staggering 6 levels - we were given a whistle-stop tour of several areas of the vessel, including the catwalk, derrick and laboratories, where we were able to see 1 hour - old ocean cores, which had been freshly extracted by the 62m drill.





At the end of the tour, students were able to ask the crew some questions, which ranged from 'How does magnetism of the rocks become contaminated after they have formed' and 'What are the global benefits of this research, with regards to identifying the size and location of mantle plumes?' to 'Do you have any pets on board?' The JR isn't just a place of work and lots of our students were interested about life on the ship. We learned that crew take part in 12 hour shifts and have access to a state of the art gym, as well as a library, and 24 hour access to freshly baked goodies! Our budding geologists and geographers greatly enjoyed time out of the classroom to learn about living and working on the JR; perhaps in a few years' time one of our own Bedians might report back from their latest JR voyage.




Sixth Form Language Ambassadors

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Safeguarding Tips - A Parent's Guide

A quick weekly guide in one area of Safeguarding from Safeguarding Lead Mr Sanders.

A positive body image is an important step in building positive mental health and emotional well-being. Sadly, many young people nationally are now suffering from a poor body image. It is often reported that girls feel significant pressure to match up to unrealistic media appearances, however, boys are affected too. Parents can play a key role in supporting children to develop a positive body image. There are a number of things you can do to support your child in developing their emotional resilience, which can equip them to develop positive self-esteem and a healthy body image.

TALK POSITIVELY ABOUT THEIR BODY AND WHAT IT CAN DO RATHER THAN HOW IT LOOKS

It is never too early to give messages to your children about loving and appreciating their bodies, e.g. "Nobody's looks are perfect, let's focus on what you like about yourself". The teenage years are a key time for body image worries to increase and you still have a critical role to play. Your views and the ability to keep communication open at this time will make all the difference.



BE A GOOD ROLE MODEL

Children are very aware of their parents' attitudes and behaviours. For instance, avoid comparing yourself to images you see in magazines. Instead, show them that you are able to identify and evaluate the messages within adverts, especially those that relate to appearance. Try to refrain from criticising your own or others' bodies and appearance.



RECOGNISE YOUR CHILD'S QUALITIES AND SKILLS WHEN YOU PRAISE THEM

Emphasise what you appreciate about their character and skills rather than focusing on their appearance, e.g. "You always make me laugh, I love your sense of humour!" or "You're a great listener for your friend - she obviously values your support".



MANAGE THEIR SCREEN TIME

Research has shown that when children spend a lot of time in front of screens, such as on social media or playing computer games, it can have a negative impact on their body image and self-esteem. Try to ensure that there are screen-free times during the day.



KEEP COMMUNICATION OPEN

Provide plenty of opportunities to have conversations with your child where they feel they can open up about their feelings. Listen to their concerns and worries. Be mindful not to jump in to offer advice but recognise what they have said and help them come up with their own solutions, e.g. "You sound upset, I wonder what you could do that might help".


