Safeguarding

Safeguarding children on TikTok

Continuing with our theme of Digital Wellbeing, you may have seen that TikTok has recently taken steps to tighten up parental controls. This is a positive move to help reduce overexposure to the app. An Ofgem report in March this year stated that 16% of toddlers use TikTok. As of January there were 3.7 million users of TikTok in the UK.

It is largely a fun and harmless app, however, it can be addictive for young people, and expose them to inappropriate content. Some new controls include Family Pairing, which enables parents to link their account to the child's account, limiting the amount of time spent on the app each day, restricting the content and limiting who can send direct messages.

Many of our pupils have accounts, nevertheless, users are required to be a minimum age of 13 years old and we strongly advise that pupils do not make TikToks in their school uniforms for their own personal safety, as well as to avoid bringing themselves or the College into disrepute.

Learning Outside the Classroom

In the Prep School we are always looking for ways to enhance our children's learning. Educational visits are a fantastic way in which pupils can achieve a richer understanding of the topics they are studying by giving them greater context and bringing the subject to life for them. In November our children were able to experience what it was like to be a Victorian working child, the mummification process in Ancient Egypt and the life of a Roman Legionnaire.







There's Trouble at Mill!

Field trip to Quarry Bank Mill, Styal, Cheshire. November 16th.

"Children should be seen and not heard!" At least this was the case during Queen Victoria's reign. As part of their studies into Victorian Britain Prep 5 became Victorian apprentices for the day at Quarry Bank Mill. They dressed up wonderfully in period costumes and spent a day in the life of a working Victorian child.

In the Apprentice House, they were under the strict rule of Superintendent Shawcross. It was a shock when the children were ordered to make the stained straw-filled beds, empty the foul chamber pots, clean the clogs, iron and sweep up. They were horrified to discover these chores would all have to have been done after a 13 hour shift working under the machines in the hot, dusty, deafening and dangerous mill. They compared their lives to those of the poor children of the same age; orphans or workhouse children from all over England who were signed up as property of the mill owner, Samuel Greg until they were 18 years old. The children were not impressed with the leeches they would have placed on their eyes to heal infection from the mill dust nor did they wish to sample the treacle and gunpowder constipation remedy!

During their shift in the mill, Prep 5 scavenged the raw cotton from under the machines, carried the giant cotton-filled cans and doffing bobbins, whilst communicating by lip-reading and sign language, such was the deafening din of the machines.

The experience was a fantastic insight into what life would have been like for children their age in the Victorian times.







Unravelling the Secrets of the Mummy!

Field trip to Liverpool Museum. November 15th.

The Ancient Art of mummification and the secrets from the crypt were rediscovered by a group of young archaeologists in Prep 4. When studying Ancient Egypt all children are fascinated by the mysteries of the Pharaohs and the Pyramids of Giza. Since Howard Carter first discovered Tutankhamun's tomb scientists have been creating ways to unlock the enigma of the mummification process. The children of Prep 4 visited the Liverpool Museum to learn first hand how pharaohs were preserved. They worked together to carry out the process on a dummy and learned how the vital organs were removed prior to mummification; the gory details always resonate well with the children. After carrying out this ancient ritual the children were able to explore the Egyptian relics and learned about ancient Egyptian hieroglyphics. They were given a list of questions to answer by exploring the gallery and observing the wonderful array of artefacts on display. The experience is incredibly beneficial to their learning on the Egyptians and the work they produced afterwards was amazing.

The afternoon was lots of fun as the Prep 3 legion donned their military regalia, followed by a Roman soldiers' prayer ritual, and marched around the city chanting at full volume! The day also included a visit to the amphitheatre where their legion legate (group leader) put them through their paces with some battle formations. The day was thoroughly enjoyed by all and a superb learning experience for Prep 3.

Geography in Action: Engaging students in practical learning tasks

In order to engage students across KS3 in their learning, the Geography Department has been implementing more practical activities where the students are out of their seats and in front of the class. L4 were presenting weather forecasts, learning their UK nation locations and weather symbols as part of their Weather and Climate topic. Practical learning with U3 has included latitude and longitude coordinates to locate places globally, with the teacher handing over the whiteboard pen to students.

They would have to locate their favourite world destination with coordinates and with the rest of the class having to deduce or guess the country. U4 effectively demonstrated ridge push and slab pull tectonic plate movement with a human chain of students oldest to youngest, the youngest representing 'new crust' at the Mid-Atlantic ridge.

Visit from Professor Francis L Martin

On 8th November, Professor Francis L Martin delivered a talk to the Sixth Form on 'The Need for Interdisciplinary Approaches to Advance Modern Healthcare Technologies'. Prof. Martin spoke about his years of work as a research scientist, including his investigations into various cancers. He outlined the development of a spectrochemical approach that shows a need to understand the biological/clinical problem, the physics to develop a sensor applied to analyse this problem and the mathematics needed to handle the complex datasets generated.

Prof Martin also shared some very useful advice on university pathways and the career opportunities arising from current scientific research. We are very grateful for his time and hope he will return to engage further with our prospective medics, dentists and scientists.



World Kindness Day 2022






Solidarity Race


Houses Captains

Sports Captains are responsible for leading and organising sports teams for inter-house sporting events and inspiring students to participate in a range of sports.


The main role of the Fundraising Captains is to organise and implement multiple fundraising activities to support charities and communities around us. They also inspire and educate students about the value of charity.

Chaplaincy Captains help with the leadership, organisation of masses and parties. At the same time, they help pupils who need support and guidance.







New titles in!





During half term, 28 pupils from U6, L6 and U5 travelled to Cologne to take part in the Senior Football Tour. The first fixtures were against FC Rot-Weiss Lessenich's Under 17s and Under 19s in Bonn. The first fixture saw Harry O score in the final minute to secure a thrilling 4-3 victory after goals from Harry C, Joaquin T and James C. This was followed by a great performance in the second fixture which St Bede's won 3-0 thanks to a hat trick from Benat M.

The squad had a tour of FC Koln's RheinEnergie Stadium and a training session with FC Koln coaches before visiting the Michael Schumacher Karting Centre. This was followed by a visit to Bayer Leverkusen's BayArena stadium to watch the Bundesliga fixture against Wolfsburg.

The fixture was extra special as it featured three Bedians in Wolsburg's team Lukas and Felix Nmecha and Bayer Leverkusen's goal scorer on the day, Jeremie Frimpong.

The squad were unbeaten throughout the tour as they also racked up three victories against ESV Olympia of Cologne winning 1-0, 4-0 and 2-1. There were also visits to Phantasialand Theme Park and mass at Cologne Cathedral. The boys were exceptionally well behaved and a credit to the College, themselves and their families. It was great to end the tour unbeaten; Mr Griffin, Mr Morgan, Mr O'Reilly and myself, couldn't have shared a tour with a better set of pupils.

The itinerary over the four days was packed full of activities with excursions, training sessions, fixtures and some lengthy coach journeys leaving very little time to relax.

Day 1

A long day to start the trip. After landing at Schipol Airport we journeyed South to our hotel in Rotterdam where we just about had time to eat dinner before heading back out and up to Amsterdam for an evening spent bowling and playing mini golf. A variety of skills were on display, but I think it's safe to say none of us will be challenging Rory McIlroy any time soon!





Day 2

The football and hockey training sessions at FC Utrecht and Kampong HC were excellent and it was pleasing to see both groups fully engage in the sessions. Kampong HC has over 4000 playing members and we were lucky enough to be in the company of two of their international legends; firstly our coach two-time World Goalkeeper of the Year, David Harte, and then the Netherlands legend that is Lidewij Welten - four times Olympic Gold Medallist and World Player of the Year in 2015.

We played our first fixtures in the afternoon and came away with some very pleasing results:

Football v DSVP

- U13 won 6-0. St Bede's controlled the game from the start and limited DSVP to a handful of chances.
- U14 won 10-0. Fabulous performance from everyone, totally dominated and outclassed the opposition.
- U15 v Rotterdam United, lost 1-6. Tough opener, strong opposition with some exceptional players.

Hockey v Ommoordse Mixed Hockey Club

Split up into four teams of 7, each team played three highly competitive and fun games.











Day 3

Another set of fixtures played in a fair but highly competitive manner. In the football St Bede's played three matches against Voetbal Vereniging Oost Rotterdam (Football Association East Rotterdam)

- U13 drew 4-4. Classic end to end, free flowing game. A draw was a fair result.
- U14 won 6-0. Another superb performance, a masterclass of possession football and accurate finishing.
- U15 won 4-2. Fairly even game on chances created but St Bede's made the most of their opportunities,

In Hockey St Bede's took to the field against HC Feijenoord in a fabulous arena in the shadow of FC Feijenoord Academy.

- U13/14 lost 2-5. Feijenoord were the better team but the main difference was that they took their chances when our girls didn't. A lesson in being clinical.
- U14/15 lost 0-4. Intense, hard fought game against a well organised and more experienced team. The girls played well but conceded a goal in each quarter and went down 0-4.




