






Using Tools within our reach for Good



Maths in Action

On Friday the 24th of November the Lower Sixth A level Maths and Further Maths students, accompanied by Mrs Collard and Mr Segura Renau, embarked on a study trip to King's Conference Centre Manchester for the Maths in Action live event. There they were able to engage with an entire day of interactive and thought-provoking talks.

Dr Yolanda Ohene, a neuroimaging scientist, highlighted the crucial role maths plays in developing imaging techniques. Her talk resonated with budding Bedian biologists, showcasing the integral role of maths in their beloved science.

Dr Simon Singh, a familiar name from the A-Level Maths wider reading list, discussed Fermat's Last Theorem. Sharing insights into Andrew Wiles' proof, he brought maths to life, leaving a lasting impact on students, as expressed by Maciej W.: "His talk brought maths to life and helped me realise Maths is so much more than just some mundane numbers on a page."

Dr. Colin Wright's memorable talk, 'Maths with a twist', introduced topology, showcasing the study of shapes and surfaces. Sophie Maclean presented 'Mathemusic', an interactive session prompting student participation. Alison Kiddle's talk on risk and reward aligned perfectly with the statistics side of the A level Maths course.

Guest speakers provided valuable tips for A level Maths exams, unanimously appreciated by students. The trip not only offered insights into pursuing maths as a career but also showcased the interconnected role of maths in our lives.

The students were keen to take part in the talks, even volunteering to go up on stage and get hands-on. The trip provided students with the opportunity to get an indication of what it would be like to pursue maths as a future career and the plethora of opportunities that securing a solid grade in A-Level Maths brings. The live event allowed students to envision maths as part of a bigger picture, as a multifaceted subject which plays an interconnected role in each aspect of our lives. Morocco Charity Work

One of our Sixth Form students travelled to Morocco in October to assist family friends suffering in the aftermath of the earthquake that hit the country. Here is his account of his experience:

On the 8th of September 2023, Morocco was hit by an earthquake of a magnitude 6.8, 11.5 miles deep, with the epicentre 44 miles southwest of Marrakesh. This devastated many families and homes, killing 3000 and leaving thousands injured whilst affecting 6,600,000 and isolating some regions up in the Atlas mountains. I went to Morocco a month later to help out in a small village where I have some family and friends. They were left with the long term effects of the earthquake, including demolished homes and destroyed farmland. As the inhabitants of the village produce their own food through farming crops and animals, this hit them really hard. Another important thing that was damaged was schools, so as part of my work, I got over 30 sets of school supplies and handed them out to the children. We bought pencil cases, pens, rubbers, pencils, rulers, lined books, gridded paper books, and plain books, which the children were so happy to receive. All in all I really enjoyed being there and helping out. It was an eye opener to see what had actually happened and the effects after the earthquake, and good to be able to help those in need.






Nine Lessons and Carols


