So let us redefine joy, not as a search for the extraordinary, but as an appreciation of the ordinary, for in these simple moments we discover the true magic of joy.







Upper Fourth Geographers Out and About in Salford Quays and Didsbury

The Upper Fourth GCSE Geographers enjoyed a great day out in the field and were not put off by the cold January conditions. The students (and teachers!) spent a very chilly Wednesday morning investigating the significant changes that have taken place in Salford Quays following deindustrialisation and globalisation, and the subsequent decline of Manchester Docks. The students readily engaged and took full advantage of the opportunity to practise fieldwork techniques, at various locations around the Quays. The focus was to investigate urban regeneration in a central location in Greater Manchester. This included the collection of quantitative and qualitative data, such as environmental quality surveys, pedestrian counts and making judgements on the apparent success of the regeneration.

Practising these skills is good preparation for the students' GCSE fieldwork examination. The later part of the day was spent in Didsbury. The focus here was to understand how Didsbury has grown and changed over time, and how its character and 'feel' has evolved as it has become a busy, in-demand, suburb of Manchester. The students conducted questionnaires and surveys to investigate aspects of Didsbury that are not immediately obvious to the casual observer.

Students' attitude and behaviour was excellent throughout the day, and, considering the cold conditions, a lot of good quality work was completed. Another successful trip from the Geography Department!

Sixth Form trip to Land Rover Jaguar Factory

Design Technology and Business Sixth Form pupils recently visited Land Rover Jaguar in Solihull for a fascinating factory tour.

We visited the body shop and saw their state of the art production line with its mix of robot and human assembly. This part of the factory has over 300 robots in it; at one stage of the process we witnessed a group of robots putting hundreds of rivets into one car in just 90 seconds!

We were driven around the site to various parts of the factory complex in custom-made safari-style Land Rover vehicles. When visiting the museum the guides discussed the design process and the evolution of the Range Rover, and at the end of the talk pupils were given the opportunity to sit in the latest limited edition Range Rover. The tour guides were extremely knowledgeable and friendly. We were shown many processes and working practices that feature in the course's content, making it an excellent learning experience.

It takes 36 hours for a Range Rover to be made and one is completed every 90 seconds. We watched the end of the production line, witnessing the very latest Range Rovers taking their first steps (wheel spins).

The pupils' behaviour was exemplary, they asked pertinent questions and gave excellent answers.

How to get involved

Our societies aim to amplify diverse voices through collaborative events and projects, encouraging students to become cultural ambassadors. They can join existing societies or establish new ones reflecting their culture. As ambassadors, students actively contribute by organising events and taking the lead on initiatives such as assemblies or fundraising campaigns. We encourage students to join the BDI for opportunities to enhance their university applications, develop leadership skills, broaden perspectives, establish meaningful connections, and actively shape a diverse and welcoming school community.

Past projects

In recognition of Black History Month in October, the BDI launched a comprehensive campaign highlighting the historical significance of the month in promoting diversity and inclusion. The BDI was unveiled through a series of engaging Black History Month assemblies for each year group, sparking excitement and discourse among students and teachers. The focus was on shedding light on lesser-known Black History figures, enriching our understanding of history, and challenging traditionally centred narratives.

The assemblies provided a thorough overview spanning 350,000 years of black history, exploring topics such as the origin of the first homo sapiens, Mansa Musa of the Mali Empire, Blackamoors in Tudor England, Queen Nzinga of Angola, the Fulani Conquest establishing Islam in Nigeria, and the rise and fall of the Zulu Empire. Each session concluded with the introduction of the BDI and a prayer inspired by Simon of Cyrene.

Our successful cultural food stall at the Christmas fair showcased a diverse selection of delightful treats from around the world, including flavorful Nigerian meat pies and refreshing horchata.

The enthusiastic response generated over £400! This success highlighted the significance of cultural exchange and celebration during the festive season.

We also advocated for inclusive head microphones in school productions as the beige-coloured microphones drew unnecessary attention to black actors. Following our inquiry, positive changes have been made. In the recent Legally Blonde production, non-white actors had the option to use dark head microphones, reflecting our commitment to addressing visibility and representation.

The BDI is a catalyst for change, promoting inclusivity within our school community. These societies provide a platform for students to celebrate, learn, and share, weaving a tapestry of understanding that strengthens community bonds. The BDI is more than an initiative; it is a testament to the power of student-driven change, shaping a more inclusive and vibrant educational environment at St. Bede's.



St Bede's University and Careers Fair

Students from Upper Fourth to Lower Sixth and their parents were invited to St Bede's University and Careers Fair on the evening of February 8th. Despite a handful of institutions having to pull out of the event due to severe weather warnings, the Sports Hall was nevertheless full of representatives from the Universities of Liverpool, Manchester Strathclyde, Stirling, Bangor and Salford as well as Bangor, Lancaster, Edge Hill and Manchester Metropolitan Universities, plus more.

This year, we were delighted to welcome UA92, which offers a range of qualifications, including apprenticeships. The Fair also featured representatives from TUI, McHale & Co Solicitors, the Army and AJ Bell. Attendees listened to speakers from a range of sectors sharing their experiences and advice on various career paths.

Adam Richards from TUI talked to students about his experience as a pilot on the B737. He also introduced the industry-leading Airline Multi-Crew Pilot Licence Cadet Programme delivered by TUI, giving advice on how best to tackle the competitive application process.

This was followed by a presentation from McHale and Co Solicitors, offering insight into the various routes that can be taken to achieve a career in law. The evening was then closed by Malaika Nisbett, a student at the University of Manchester pursuing a master's degree in Mechanical Engineering with Nuclear Engineering. Malaika made attendees aware of the challenges that those wishing to embark on an Engineering course may encounter, and offered guidance on how to overcome them. We are grateful to these speakers for giving up their valuable time for our students.

PwC hosted the event in collaboration with ACEN (African Caribbean Education Network) to raise awareness of various early careers opportunities within their organisation, highlighting their in-person graduate scheme to students of African Caribbean heritage, noting their underrepresentation on these programmes and in these environments nationally.

A guest speaker shared his inspirational journey of moving to the UK from South Africa; after becoming an accountant he

rose through the ranks of PwC where he is now in a successful leadership role.

We also had the opportunity to speak to five students currently enrolled in various in-person PwC graduate programs; we learned about their experiences, asked questions and gained insight into the day-to-day lives of an apprentice.

The event provided a valuable opportunity for students to connect with professionals, engage in meaningful conversations, exchange contacts, and build relationships that could lead to future collaborations. It successfully fostered a supportive and inclusive environment for black students to thrive in the business world.







CHAPLAINCY

Two years ago, I organised a surprise birthday party for a school friend who, for many years, has been suffering from a very serious degenerative illness.

I spoke to his wife, arranged the cake and candles, venue and menu, and invited some other friends, but could not think of anything to give him as a birthday present.

It was then that another of my friends suggested buying him "an experience". At first, I didn't understand what "buying an experience" meant until my friend told me about the different vouchers offered online ranging from a message or an escape room to skydiving, bungee jumping, or going skiing on sand dunes in Africa.



We live in a society where more and more people seek strong sensorial experiences. And whereas there is nothing intrinsically wrong with it, we run the risk of turning our life into a succession of superficial and sensorial experiences and so becoming "experience junkies"; and what is worst, by doing so we can neglect or miss the greatest experience we have all been called to: the experience of our faith.

During the period of Lent, the Church invites us to another type of experience, one of repentance and conversion. This spiritual experience, unlike the sensorial and superficial one, can become when we welcome and embrace, with an open mind and heart, a transforming and healing experience.

At the core of this experience stands the sacrament of reconciliation. In this, we are given the opportunity to recognise our sins and ask God for his pardon and forgiveness but, above all, we are presented with the love and mercy of God. No Gospel scene portrays better the essence of this sacrament than The Parable of the Prodigal Son. This Gospel passage narrates the embrace of the father to his younger son who, poor, sad and dressed in rags, returns home after having squandered the father's inheritance.

It is precisely this healing and paternal love that we encounter in the sacrament that empowers us to restart our Christian struggle again, aided by the help and grace of God. And so during this time of Lent, we want to invite you to live the strongest and the most transforming experience of all, that of experiencing the love and forgiveness of God in your own life. A fresh start for our journey of faith!

During this term, at St Bede's we have dedicated one of the year group assemblies to explaining the beauty and healing power of this sacrament and have given the opportunity to students to go to confession. We want to make this experience available to parents, so we will be offering confessions after the 8.20am and 9am Masses on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays.
