#### Girls on Board

We were delighted to host the Girls on Board conference at St Bede's this month. Andrew Hampton delivered his renowned training to staff from both St Bede's College and Prep, as well as to a range of delegates from schools in the North West. The Girls on Board approach helps to empower girls to resolve their friendship issues by themselves, without the need for adult intervention.

The session in the morning helped staff to see that, although well meaning, adult input can often not assist the girls to resolve their problems. In the afternoon, a group of Upper Third girls met with Andrew, and he talked to them about friendship, the pros and cons of different group sizes and then the girls had fun role playing different situations which can cause fall outs. The point of the exercises was to evoke empathy in the girls and to help them see things from others' perspectives. This was especially true when Andrew spoke of 'the girl in the water' who was no longer on board with the rest of the friendship group. The Upper Third girls explained that it was their responsibility to ensure no girl is ever left behind without a friend.

Mrs Ward, Head of Upper Third, found the conference enlightening: 'I am so proud of how enthusiastically the Upper Third girls participated in the afternoon session. They spoke eloquently and maturely, and embodied the Bedian Values whilst genuinely seeming to enjoy the session.'

We were grateful to receive the training from Andrew in person and hope to put some of the ideas into practice.

#### 'Afire': Lower Fifth German Students at the Movies

This month, Lower Fifth German students took part in a fantastic German GCSE Study Morning at HOME, Manchester. This exciting event was led by Sebastian Truskolaski, lecturer in German Cultural Studies at the University of Manchester, and included a screening of Christian Petzold's 'Afire' (Rote Himmel, 2023), a German language film.

'Afire' tells the story of a group of friends staying in a remote cottage on the German Baltic Coast where self-centred Leon, an author, is trying to finish his second book. Emotions run high as the forests that surround them slowly catch fire, leading Leon to question whether he can truly care for anyone or anything but himself.

The session began with an introduction from Sebastian regarding the film's main themes, namely love, friendship and identity, but also, more subtly, climate change. The backdrop of the former German Democratic Republic also featured heavily.

Following the film, pupils took part in a discussion of the film, which certainly gave them a taste for studying German at A Level. There were, of course, some language-based exercises to complete, but pupils agreed that it was "nice to get exposure to authentic German media and learn about cultural differences between East and West Germany" (Lewis F), as well as "gain new vocabulary and knowledge about German History" (Luca C).








































One of our esteemed speakers was **Professor Margaret Kingston**, Consultant Physician at Manchester Royal Infirmary and Director of Undergraduate Medical Studies at the University of Manchester. Professor Kingston oversees the management of all the medical students in the University of Manchester and is an expert in looking after patients with complex infections. Our students loved chatting with her at dinner and finding out more about the reality of being a student of Medicine.



We were also delighted to have **Professor Joe Rafferty** CBE join us. After completing a PhD in molecular genetics, Professor Rafferty researched drug resistance in cancer. He went on to hold a series of senior NHS leadership roles and is now CEO of Mersey Care NHS Trust. He is a founder member of the Zero Suicide Alliance UK and is an honorary professor at the University of Liverpool Institute for Population Health Sciences. Professor Rafferty thoroughly engaged his audience, advising our students on how to deal with setbacks on the road to success.



Mr Ian Gillis, Partner at Hill Dickinson LLP is also a non-executive director of GB Taekwondo and on the board of the largest chain of independent opticians in the UK. Mr Gillis is a co-owner of multiple retail businesses selling designer clothes and accessories online and in stores. He advised our students to take ownership of their futures by envisioning their achievements and then making them a reality.



Mrs Laura Rodriguez, a senior structural engineer at Curtins, demonstrated to our students that a career need not be in a predictable straight line. She has a broad experience working on and delivering projects and deals with contractors, clients and architects to bring projects from tender to construction stage. She told our audience about her new role within her engineering consultancy as Learning & Development Specialist where her focus is the development of the training strategy and performance management of engineers.



Caroline explained that 55,900 people are diagnosed with breast cancer in the UK every year. Published in 1940, Richard Wright's 'Native Son' sold an astonishing 215,000 copies within three weeks of publication - a major event in American literary history. St Bede's Sixth Formers Bridget S and Oliver T recently discussed the novel at the local independent schools' Sixth Form Book Club, hosted, this time, by Withington Girls' School. They were also joined by students from Manchester Grammar School and Manchester High School for Girls who argued whether the text challenged or reproduced stereotypes of black men at the time, and showed appreciation of its portrayal of injustice and repression. There was a lively discussion about the place of communism in the text and about Wright's misogynist depiction of women. We are looking forward to the next meeting of the Sixth Form Book Club.




#### Track My Read

## CHAPLAINCY

Holy Week presents an opportunity for a new experience of conversion. It is a time of special grace, when we are invited to contemplate the love of God revealed through His Son's passion and death on the Cross, as well as the profound joy of His resurrection.



In the spiritual realm, we all grapple with a form of "Spiritual Challenge" that hinders our understanding of God's love and His message of salvation. Holy Week offers us the chance to look into the eyes of Jesus and uncover, behind His emotions, words, actions, and deeds, God's deep and tender love for humanity and His desire to bestow upon us eternal life.

Something similar to this occurred to Clare Crockett, a 17 year old young Irish girl who discovered the love of God on a Good Friday Service she had never intended to attend. Before that moment, Clare had lived the typical life of a young girl, distant from her faith and sacraments, and with the sole ambition of becoming a movie star.


Years later, she herself recounted the beginning of her conversion when she kissed the feet of Jesus on the Cross: "I only remember that I kissed the nail that went through the feet of Jesus and received the grace to see that God had died for me on the Cross - for my sins, for my vanities, for my infidelities, for my impurity... I saw how I nailed the Lord to the Cross and that the only way that I could console Him was to give Him my life". The rest of the story can be found in a film that I thoroughly enjoyed, and cannot recommend highly enough for this season.

At the heart of the conversion experience stands the sacrament of confession. This term at the school, we have had the privilege of hosting Gabriella Stephens, a Catholic Evangelist, who has shared her powerful testimony of love for this sacrament with the students. As a school, we are committed to making the understanding of the gift of Christ through the sacraments the heart of the chaplaincy life. We want to make them more available to students, staff and parents throughout the year.

Confession is a sacrament for all seasons, but Lent is a particularly appropriate time for it. During Lent, we reflect on Christ's sacrifice on the Cross, where he paid the price for our redemption, ultimately granting us freedom and a new life through his resurrection. And so I want to finish by inviting you all to experience, during these holiest weeks of the year, the profound love and forgiveness that are fruits of the Cross.


