On Tuesday, we came together to celebrate the Feast Day of Our

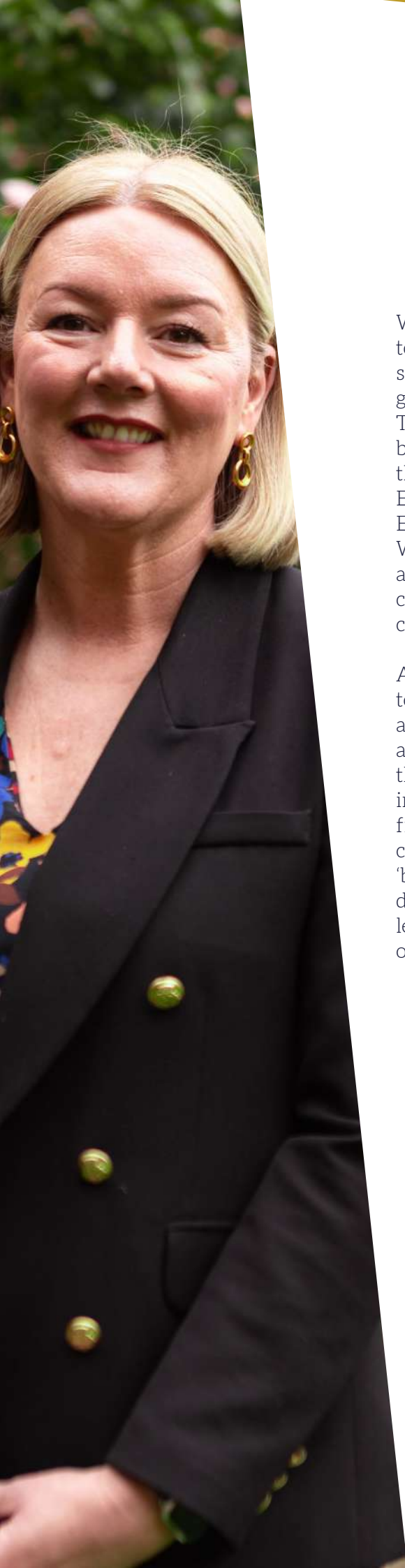

Mobile Phone Safety in School

There are numerous studies which suggest screen time is counterproductive to a good night's sleep. A recent BBC Panorama programme posed the question [Can We Live Without Our Phones?](#) which made for very interesting viewing and is still available on BBC iPlayer.

In Australia there have been calls to ban social media for all under 16s and in the UK the minimum age for social media accounts such as Snapchat, Instagram, Facebook and Whatsapp is 13. With calls for smartphones to be banned for children due to the dangers associated with extreme and harmful content, we stand by our mobile phone policy in school which should help pupils to focus on school life, rather than be distracted by technology.

As a reminder, no phones, headphones or AirPods should be visible between 8.50 a.m. and 3.50 p.m. and, as pupils come onto site in the morning, they are asked to start putting away their devices. Pupils should also have their phones switched off.

If parents need to get hold of their child urgently, they should call College Reception where a message will be passed to the child. If a child needs to call you urgently, they should seek permission from a member of staff and go to reception to make the call.

If pupils are on their phones without permission their phone will be confiscated and not returned until the end of the week, unless it is confiscated on a Friday and then it will be retained until the following Friday. In the event of this unfortunate situation, we will of course endeavour to make direct contact with you so that you are aware, and we will ensure a pupil has the necessary funds to travel home, if they normally do so via public transport, on the first night of confiscation, but request your support in making arrangements for the subsequent nights.

Similarly, parents should resist the urge to contact children directly in the school day and discourage their children from texting them, especially if they are upset or not feeling well.

We are here to care for and support your children during the day and we have a school nurse on site who will make the decision whether a child needs to be collected for medical reasons. If your child suffers with a medical condition, this should be divulged to the school nurse (matron@sbcm.co.uk) so she is aware and knows which pupils to monitor closely.

the local fauna, and learning how to care for the earth, Bedian Rangers will cultivate curiosity and social responsibility - core values of our school.

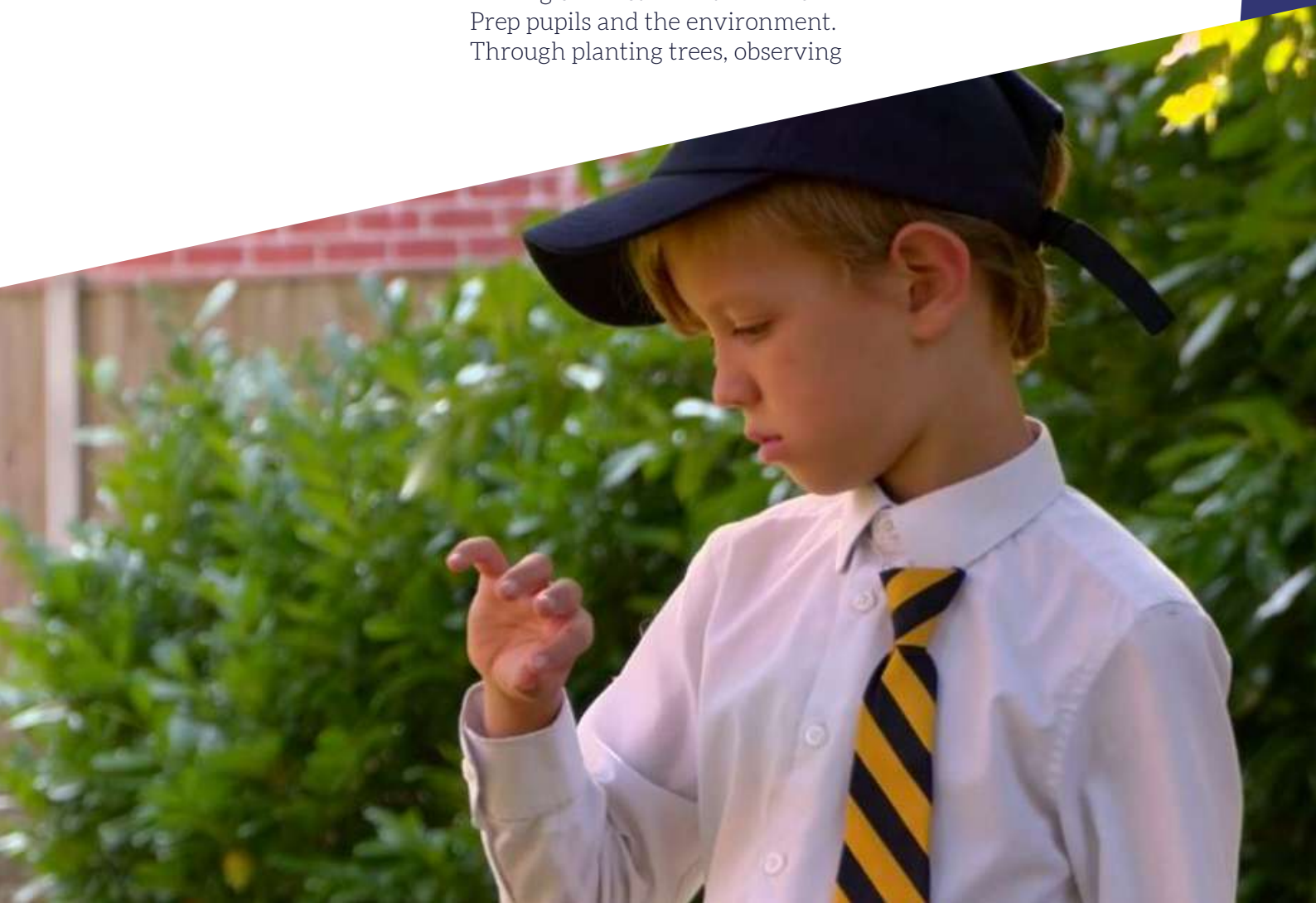

Lourdes Pilgrimage 2024

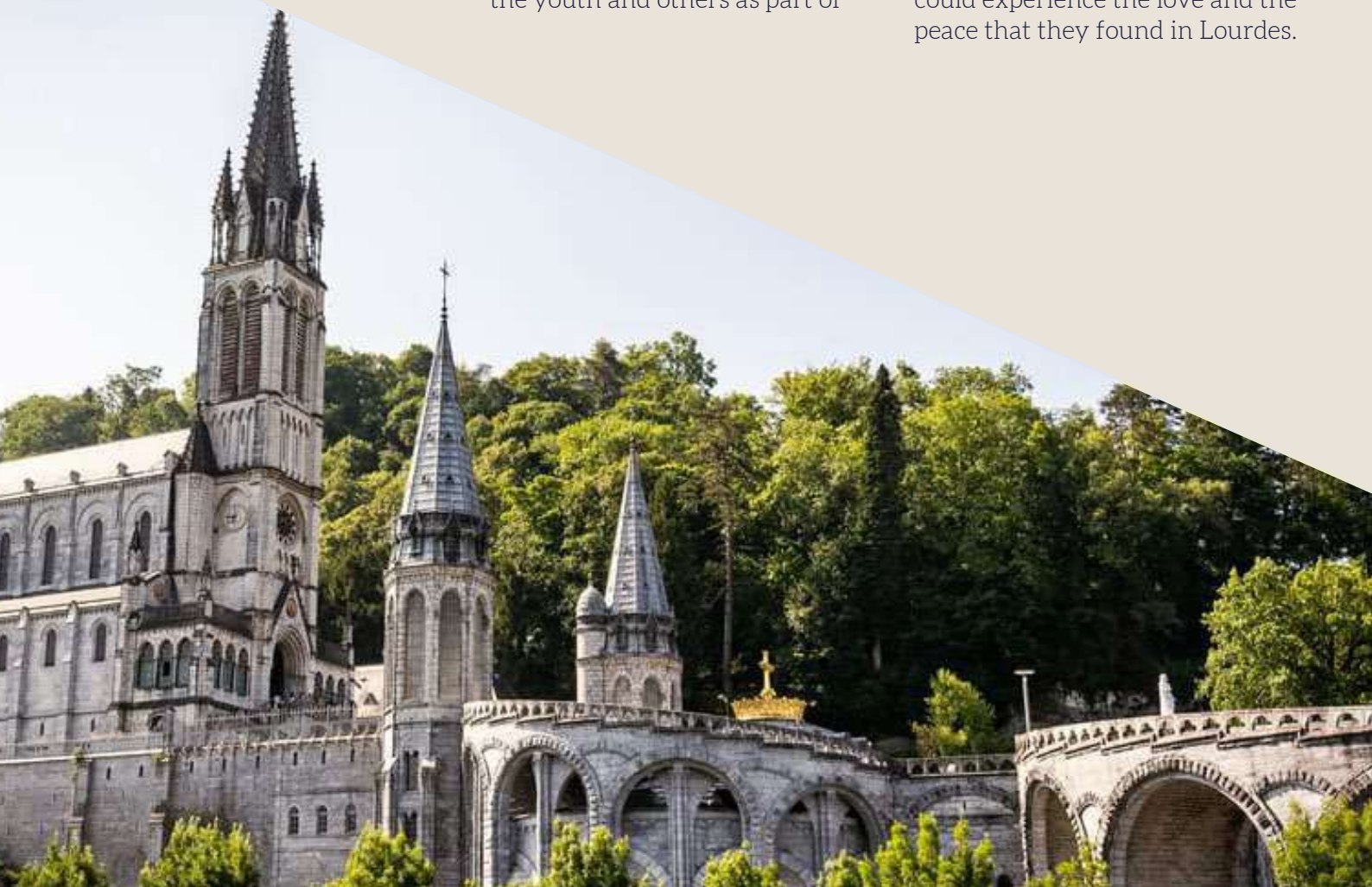
Once again I was privileged to take a fantastic group of Sixth Form students to Lourdes as part of the Salford Diocese Centenary anniversary pilgrimage and, as always, it was a profound experience for us all. We reflected that as Catholics our role is to be God's Ambassadors on earth and by volunteering to help those who would otherwise be unable to go to Lourdes, we were fulfilling that mission.

One of the themes of the pilgrimage was that of accompaniment as we were reminded that regardless of our abilities we walked side by side in supporting each other and everyone had something valuable to offer.

The week involved a variety of services, some specifically for the youth and others as part of

the wider diocese and Lourdes community. The candlelight procession is always very moving and inspiring, and my personal favourite is the healing service which Maciej describes so beautifully below. The students were particularly touched by the Water Gesture led by Bishop John which they decided they would like to share with the whole College, so they bought the largest container they could find, filled it with holy water and carried it back on the plane. It was a good job our luggage wasn't weighed!

One other new tradition they started was to bring every new Upper Third student a mini-rosary, to be given out at Welcome Mass. They wanted to inspire and encourage our younger students to invite Our Lady into their lives so they too could experience the love and the peace that they found in Lourdes.



There was also time for exploring the area, a trip to the Lac du Lourdes and we absolutely aced the fancy dress party. It was an amazing week, however, don't take just my word for it, the student testimony is much more powerful:

When first starting our journey to Lourdes, I was nervous of the social setting and unsure what the upcoming week would consist of. However, as the week unfolded, each experience provided me with more to reflect upon and my feeling of belonging in Lourdes kept growing. When I first passed the Grotto, I felt a peace that I had never had the chance to experience before and this feeling flourished during my stay at Lourdes. It was the perfect opportunity for me to just think and fully focus on my prayers - something which comes very rarely in my day to day life! Having to pick a single experience from my competitive list of favourite activities is simply an

injustice. If I had to throw one out there, the Anointing of the Sick was one of the more personally touching for me. What began as a regular service developed into the strongest, most evident show of unity - a true symbol of the interdependent relation of pilgrim and volunteer, and offered a new perspective to my personal pilgrimage and everything I was both giving and receiving.

Each experience I had in Lourdes spoke to me in a different way and taught me about the way I interact with God, and the way I should look to interact in the future. The peace and grace of Our Lady is present like nowhere else, and it allows

the perfect environment for your thoughts to bloom into a beautiful flower. Moreover, the effect of Lourdes is not temporary. It teaches you how to care of that flower, how to ensure it remains resilient, and how to encourage the growth of different flowers to cultivate a beautiful garden.

Rafal, who was not a first-time visitor to Lourdes but a first-time volunteer, reflects:

I have been fortunate enough to have visited Lourdes on five occasions with my family as part of the Salford Diocese children and family group, but this year was the first time I went without my family and as a helper representing St Bede's College. Both pilgrimages are very rewarding, but in different ways. Experiencing Lourdes with the children and family group focuses mainly on the children. There are activities, social events, and all the services incorporate the children as participants, either by using musical instruments, singing with actions, or doing the readings. Experiencing Lourdes as a helper was much more dedicated to a spiritual journey, whereby you have the privilege of helping and assisting an individual who otherwise would not have the opportunity to go to events, be part of a group, and have fun. you have done something good and made someone happy. For those few days, it will be a holiday that the person will treasure for much longer than you can imagine.

Alexander and Kamwana's success is a testament to their intellectual curiosity, hard work,

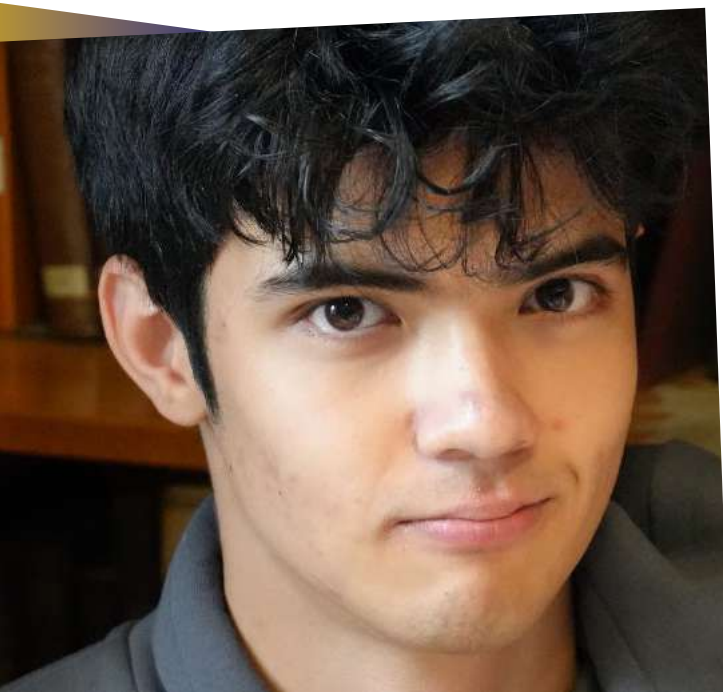
and dedication to their studies. Competing against peers from some of the top schools in the world, they demonstrated a deep understanding of economic principles and impressed the judges with their insightful essays.
