AT THE HEART OF DAVID HOCKNEY...

On January 22nd, the whole Prep school embarked on an unforgettable journey to the David Hockney exhibition at Aviva Studios in the heart of Manchester's vibrant and ever expanding city centre. This cutting-edge venue, with its spacious and innovative design, set the stage for an immersive experience like no other.

The exhibition, titled Bigger & Closer (not smaller & further away), features Hockney's iconic art in a way that invites visitors to step inside his world through huge, stateof-the-art projections. Having first opened at Lightroom in London to critical acclaim, this is the first time the show has travelled beyond the capital, and Manchester was lucky to be its next stop. The use of revolutionary sound and projection technologies created environment that felt truly alive; the artwork itself was constantly evolving around us.


The experience was divided into six chapters, each showcasing phase different of Hockney's remarkable career, from his iconic LA landscapes to his more recent works from Yorkshire and Normandy. As the exhibition progressed, the room transformed with each new section, illuminating the progression of Hockney's art and the innovative methods he has used throughout his life.

The children learnt about a variety techniques, aspects perspective, experimentation with photography and exploration of new technologies. We saw how Hockney uses photography as a "way of drawing with a camera," creating stunning collages of polaroids that capture the passing of time, and how he embraces digital tools, such as his iPad, to capture the joy of spring. The visual feast was accompanied by a specially composed score by Nico Muhly that set the mood, guiding us through the experience in a deeply engaging way.

For anyone with a passion for art or technology, this exhibition is not to be missed. It also served as a reminder of just how lucky we are to have such a plethora of cultural opportunities on our doorstep. We all left with a deeper appreciation of David Hockney's work and the ways in which art can evolve, grow, and continue to inspire.














PREP INDOOR ATHLETICS SUCCESS

We are proud to announce Victor in the Upper Third as the first pupil this year to achieve the coveted Gold badge, earning over 500 house points. He was soon followed by Josep, who earned the second Gold badge. The two boys sat down with Mrs. Ward to reflect on their outstanding transition to the College.

Victor, congratulations on achieving the Gold badge for house points! How does it feel to be the first pupil this year to receive this award?

Victor - It feels really good! I knew at the start of the year I wanted to get the gold award but I didn't think I would be the first. It feels as though my hard work has paid off. We didn't have Class Charts in the prep; it was very exciting when it was first introduced to Upper Third and watching your positive points increase over time. What I like about the system is that I feel like it appreciates when you do extra things, more than just what is asked of you.

Together, you both earned the first Bronze, Silver, and Gold awards this year. What do you think has been the key to your success?

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY - INTERVIEWING A SURVIVOR

On the 27th of January was Holocaust Memorial Day, a group of U4 pupils participated in a Zoom event in the Library hosted by the National Literacy Trust with children's author Tom Palmer and Holocaust survivor Alfred Garwood.

Alfred was born in a Nazi ghetto, imprisoned in Bergen-Belsen Concentration Camp, and later put on a train destined for Terezin Concentration Camp when he and his family were liberated by the Red Army. Alfred spent the rest of his childhood in Britain and grew up in the center of a community of Holocaust survivors. He has since written extensively on the psychological implications of trauma relating to genocide whilst also working as a General Practitioner.

This event was hugely impactful upon our pupils and gave them real insight into the experiences and impact of those who were persecuted under the Nazi regime. The pupils had the opportunity to ask questions, as well as hear Alfred's testimony and message to future generations. One of the pupils commented that 'I'd never really thought of how traumatizing the War could have been for children (...) it gave me a new perspective' (Vicky K), 'I think it was a great opportunity to hear Alfred's testimony, I've learned a lot and am very grateful' (Iria C).

MAHD INTERCONTINENTAL CUP, RIYADH, 7TH - 14TH DECEMBER

Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 is catalyzing a massive shift in the country's economic landscape, with a particular focus on reducing its reliance on oil. Tourism and leisure are central to this vision, with the government seeking to position the Kingdom as a global hub for international events, including sports.

One of the key initiatives in this regard is the MAHD Academy, launched in July 2020 under the guidance of HRH Prince Abdulaziz bin Turki al-Faisal, Saudi Arabia's Sports Minister. The academy is a cornerstone of the Kingdom's strategy to nurture and identify sports talent, and aligns with Vision 2030's broader goals of investing in youth and building world-class sports infrastructure.

A prime example of Saudi Arabia's growing sports presence is the invitation extended to Manchester City's U14 team to compete in the MAHD Intercontinental Cup, held recently in Riyadh from December 7th to 14th. The tournament brought together teams from Saudi Arabia, South Africa, Brazil, and Mexico.

After a long journey that involved a change of flights in Doha, the team arrived at the Ramada Hotel in Riyadh on Saturday afternoon. Despite the exhausting travel, the boys were immediately greeted by a camera crew, which they quickly learned would be following their every move throughout the week. The crew's presence added a touch of excitement and curiosity, but with no game that day there wasn't much action to capture.



The event itself took on a round robin format which meant that every team played each other, with the top two battling it out in the final at the end of the week. In their first match, Manchester City drew 1-1 against Deportivo Cruz Azul, a feisty team from Mexico (Nathan Aina with the goal). Each game required a winner, so the boys' nerves were put to the test with a penalty shoot out. One by one they calmly slotted home their penalties and when Cruz faltered, they took the victory 8-7. The second game was against a tough Fluminense side from Brazil. Fluminense looked physically bigger and stronger than Manchester City but they lacked the fluency and guile of their opponents and two strikes from Jayden Samuels secured a well deserved 2-1 win.

The boys had a day off after this game which they used to visit Riyadh's flagship entertainment centre, Boulevard World - a sprawling amusement park with culture at its core. It features more than a dozen pavilions dedicated to

different countries and regions where replicas of iconic landmarks can be seen, such as the Eiffel Tower. Visitors are encouraged to "travel the world" and sample the cultures and traditions of some of the most destinations including storied France, The USA, Italy, Morocco, Greece, India, China, Japan, Spain, Turkey, Africa and Thailand. The whole group, including staff and coaches, enjoyed pitting themselves against each other with a couple of games of laser tag in the 'WarZone' before splitting off into smaller groups and heading out to the their choice for country of something to eat. Italy and pizza seemed the popular choice for many, whilst the colours and smells of the Asian floating markets attracted others.

Back to the football and half way through the tournament Manchester City were well placed in the table but they were derailed slightly when they lost 2-4 to Sundowns FC (Raez Plummer as the goal scorer of both), who were a very



fast and energetic team from South Africa. Sadly, this game also saw Marcell Tanoh suffer a very bad injury to his knee which resulted in him returning home early from the tournament.

Despite this setback, the boys showed incredible resilience and strength of character, and rose again the following day to beat the well supported home team, MAHD Academy 1-0 (Nathan Aina with the goal). This result put them in the final on the last day against the team they had beaten earlier in the week, Fluminense.

The final was a tight affair with few chances for either side in the early stages. Manchester City played their usual patient, possession game, trying to move the Fluminense players about with crisp, pinpoint passing in order to carve out an opening; Fluminense bullied their way around the pitch. The first goal came from Manchester City, which

was not a surprise and even less so that it came from another cool finish by Nathan Aina. 1-0 at half time and Manchester City were looking good for their lead. But then in the second half, Fluminense appeared to find new life in their legs and they began to pile on the pressure. Conversely, Manchester City began to tire and once the score went to 1-1 the result seemed inevitable. And so it was, Fluminense went on to score the winner moments before the end of the game and time ran out for Manchester City to respond.

The boys were exceptional all week, both on and off the pitch, and during ducation sessions before each fixture. They didn't come away with the trophy but they can hold their heads high knowing they left everything out on the pitch and played each game in the right spirit. They were a pleasure to travel with and a credit to both Manchester City and St Bede's College.





THE PREVENTION OF YOUNG ADULT SUICIDE:

MIKE PALMER (3 DADS WALKING) VISITS UPPER SIXTH STUDENTS TO RAISE AWARENESS

On Tuesday, 14th January, Mr Mike Palmer from 3 Dads Walking, in with collaboration **Papyrus** (Prevention of Young Suicide), visited Upper Sixth students to discuss the story of his beloved daughter, Beth, who lost her life due to spicide at the tarder. to suicide at the tender age of 17. After this tragic event, he joined two other grieving fathers, Andy and Tim, to form 3 Dads Walking, a mission dedicated to raising awareness about a topic people often find very difficult to discuss.

Suicide is the biggest killer of people under 35 in the UK, but not enough people discuss this fact - especially in schools. Mr Palmer spoke about his journey from school to school, and to parliament; he is very much passionate about ensuring that young suicide prevention is integrated into the curriculum. At St Bede's, we fully support this mission and were enthusiastic about having him in as a guest speaker to the Sixth Form.

Papyrus, in collaboration with 3 Dads Walking, has generated over £1m. Papyrus runs a 24/7 suicide prevention hotline for anyone under the age of 35. At the end of his talk, Mr Palmer offered the Sixth Form students wristbands, pens and pins featuring further information about Papyrus.

Mr Palmer's story taught both teachers and students in attendance that it is vital we listen and support each other in times of difficulty. No matter the crises we face, there is always a solution and help available. The world is always a better place with each one of us in it.

To bring this vision to life, the Pupil Chaplains at both the Prep and College levels will be playing a key role throughout the year.


