




INTERNATIONAL PUPILS ENJOY A DAY OUT AT THE ETIHAD!

A LORD VISITS ST BEDE'S

Pupils at St Bede's welcomed a Lord to our college on Friday the 4th April. External Speaker Lord Bishop David of Manchester came to speak to students about how economic policy is developed and how decision making works in the House of Lords. Most interestingly, he shared current thinking about how House of Lords Reform aims to ensure that the House of Lords functions optimally to serve today's society.

Bishop David described how the House of Lords works with "The Other Place" (their name for the House of Commons) to develop Economic and Political Policy. He explained the composition of the House of Lords which includes -Hereditary Peers where he outlined proposals to reduce the number and introduce a retirement age or maximum service time to ensure the contribution is most appropriate.

Lord Bishop David spoke of how some Peers join the benches because of their work in society or industry. Examples are Baroness Ruth Hunt for her work in the equality and human rights charity Stonewall; and Lord David Sainsbury of Turville for his contribution to industry. He described the selection of Lords Spiritual, of which he is one, and addressed challenging question from students regarding representation of a broader range of UK faiths. Finally, Bishop David described his own private members bill which is focused on increasing wellbeing of looked after children in educational settings.

St Bede's was honoured to welcome such a prestigious external speaker who, after addressing students in a packed Academic Hall, enjoyed a walkabout and a meeting with our Chaplain Mrs Hibbert, Academic Deputy Head Mr Sanders and Deputy Head of Ethos, Mrs Boylan. He then sat for an interview with student journalist Oliver T for our internal newspaper The Buzz, while photos were taken by Student Photographer Ben H.

RSC CHEMISTRY OLYMPIAD SUCCESS!

The Chemistry Department is incredibly proud to celebrate the achievements of our students in this year's prestigious Royal Society of Chemistry Olympiad.

This challenging national competition tests pupils on advanced chemical concepts, often well beyond the A Level syllabus. The 2025 paper covered a wide range of challenging topics, from fuel cell calculations to a creative look at Charli XCX's Brat Summer. Despite its complexity, students rose to the challenge with enthusiasm and determination.

We are delighted to report that 80% of the pupils who entered received an award — a fantastic accomplishment. While the Olympiad is primarily aimed at Upper Sixth students, we were especially impressed that six talented Lower Sixth pupils chose to take part a year early; Elsie H, Alfie O and Curtis W all achieved Bronze awards. Jolie in U6 also achieved Bronze, whilst prestigious Silver awards were earned by Siena, Dara and Maciej.

We are thrilled to share that Frankie I (U6) was awarded a Gold certificate, placing her among the top 8% of entrants nationally. Following on from her Silver award last year, this is an outstanding achievement – congratulations, Frankie!

Well done to everyone who took part. The whole department is incredibly proud of your hard work and passion for Chemistry.



MORE THAN JUST A SANDWHICH: THE BUSINESS OF SCHOOL CATERING

Before the end of the April term, our L6 Business students welcomed a guest speaker: Mr Mike Pritchard from Harrison Catering Services. Harrison Catering Services is a family owned business that St Bede's use to deliver our school catering services alongside our fantastic onsite team. It was a great opportunity to hear more about how their operations work beyond selling lunch to our students, helping to enhance the students' understanding of key considerations for a real life business.

Students gained a fascinating inside look into how our daily school menus are put together, how ingredients are sourced as well as the challenges involved in ordering the right amount of stock each day and minimising leftover waste. Mr shared his valuable Pritchard experience on how their business adapts and offers different menus across the school year, the importance of strong relationships with local suppliers, and ensuring the food provided is both tasty and nutritious, with a focus on seasonal ingredients.

This was an excellent opportunity for our A-Level Business students to apply their classroom theories on stock management to the real business world, particularly relevant with a business they interact with daily and have first hand experience of. It also allowed the students the opportunity to deepen their understanding of stock management, customer needs, staff training and operational processes.

One Student, John H. said he learned about how important the process of stock control is to ensure the right amount of food is available for students while also avoiding unnecessary leftovers, bad for both the environment and business costs. He also learnt about how Harrison Catering take into account the religious and diverse cultural backgrounds of students when building their lunch menu for schools.

Caleb learned the importance of picking the right business partner and the benefits of good supplier relationships that support a business to achieve their objectives.
