A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A VICTORIAN APPRENTICE: PREP 5 AT QUARRY BANK MILL

Prep 5 had quite the shock recently when they stepped back in time and became Victorian apprentice children for the day during their visit to Quarry Bank Mill. As part of their Rights of the Child studies, the pupils have been exploring the experiences of working children in the Victorian era—and this immersive trip brought those lessons vividly to life.

Dressed in period costumes, the class spent the day living as indented mill apprentices. Their time in the Apprentice House was governed by the fearsome Superintendent Shawcross, under whose strict rule they were quickly put to work. The children made stained, straw-filled beds, emptied foul-smelling chamber pots, scrubbed clogs, ironed, and swept — all on top of imagining a gruelling 13-hour shift in the hot, dusty and dangerous mill.

Throughout the day, the pupils compared their own lives to those of children their age who lived and worked in the mill — many of them orphans or workhouse children bound to the service of mill owner

Samuel Greg until they turned 18. They were not impressed with the common "remedies" used at the time: leeches placed on infected eyes and a rather unappetising mixture of treacle and gunpowder to treat constipation!

Inside the working mill, Prep 5 got hands-on with some of the real tasks young workers would have faced. They scavenged raw cotton and were relieved to not be working beneath the dangerous machinery. They hauled heavy cotton-filled cans, and doffed bobbins, imagining the Victorian children trying to communicate through lip-reading due to the overwhelming and relentless roar of the machines.

The trip gave the children a powerful insight into what life was like for working children in Victorian times. It was an eye-opening experience that made many appreciate their modern school days just a little more — and might even lead to fewer complaints about homework!

PREP LEGO DAY

This year's Prep Lego Day focused on the theme of community, giving pupils a chance to explore the people and places that help make up their world — all through the fun and creativity of Lego building. Each class worked together during their session to design and build their very own community, using imagination, teamwork, and plenty of colourful bricks.

The activity encouraged children to think about what a community is and who is part of it. Their Lego creations included everything from houses and shops to hospitals and parks, and much more. Each class came up with their own unique ideas and layouts, reflecting both the real world and their creative visions of what a great community could look like.

Working in small groups, pupils shared their thoughts, helped one another, and made decisions together. It was lovely to see how well they collaborated — listening, problem-solving and supporting each other throughout the session.

Prep Lego Day also supported learning in STEM. Pupils explored how to build stable structures, planned designs, and used mathematical thinking to bring their ideas to life. It was a hands-on, engaging way to apply STEM skills in a fun and meaningful context.

PREP EXPLORING SCIENCE OUTDOORS

This year, pupils in the Prep have greatly benefited from taking part in outdoor science lessons. Learning in a hands-on manner within a natural setting has significantly enhanced their engagement with scientific topics. The outdoor environment has provided rich opportunities for pupils to observe, explore, and deepen their understanding of various scientific concepts through real-life experiences.

Pupils in Prep 4 have been studying the human body through a range of creative and active activities. One particularly effective exercise was a digestive organs treasure hunt, which helped pupils understand the sequence and function of organs involved in digestion. They also constructed models of teeth using natural materials, considering the distinct shapes and purposes of different types of teeth. Additionally, pupils created and labelled skeletons using sticks, stones and leaves — an enjoyable and memorable way to learn the names and locations of major bones in the human body.

Prep 5 pupils have explored the topics of space and forces through outdoor investigations. To develop their understanding of the scale of the solar system, they mapped out the distances between planets on the playground, gaining valuable insight into the vastness of space. They also used models to compare the relative sizes of the planets. In their study of forces, pupils explored the concept of air resistance by experimenting with speed training parachutes, observing how forces can influence the movement of objects.

In Prep 3, pupils have focused on the study of plants and animals. They have taken part in invertebrate explored hunts, what organisms need in order to grow, and observed pollination firsthand. As part of their Bedian Rangers lessons, they have also been growing their own fruits and vegetables-from planting seeds to watching them developing a deeper appreciation of how food is the conditions produced and necessary for successful cultivation.



The experience of learning outdoors has brought numerous educational benefits. has fostered It collaboration, encouraged curiosity, and supported a sense of discovery among pupils. The outdoor setting has provided space for active learning and varied teaching approaches, which in turn have contributed to improved concentration and well-being. Most importantly, engaging with science in the natural environment has helped pupils connect their learning with the world around them, reinforcing the idea that science is not confined to the classroom, but is an integral part of everyday life.

ENGLISH CREATIVE WRITING RETREAT

A group of 12 students from L4-U5, along with Mr Rees and Miss Moore embarked on a week-long creative writing retreat at Ty Newydd, the National Writing Centre of Wales. Nestled by the stunning coastline, this immersive experience provided a unique opportunity for aspiring young writers to hone their craft in beautiful and inspiring environment. The pupils spent five days at the retreat and engaged with range of activities. workshops and walks along the coast.

Throughout the week, students engaged in a dynamic programme of workshops each morning, led by professional authors and poets. They genres explored various techniques, from crafting compelling narratives and vivid poetry to developing character voice and plot structures. Daily sessions experimentation, encouraged critical thinking, and a deeper understanding of the writing process. Pupils were tutored by acclaimed author Susan Stokes Chapman and prize-winning poet Vicky Morris.

Beyond the intensive writing sessions, students benefited from the stunning surroundings mansion and had a balance of writing immersion and free time. There were opportunities for collaborative writing exercises. tutorial feedback sessions with tutors, and independent writing time, fostering both individual growth in their writing, whilst also allowing for plenty of games of Uno, The Traitors, rounders! Evening activities included helping chef Tony in the kitchen, readings from authors and tutors, discussions, and time for reflection. We ended the week with a writing recital, paired with hot chocolate, which gave students the opportunity to share aloud the work they had created with their peers.

DUKE OF EDINBIURGH

Bronze DofE Expedition - A Confident First Step

It was with great excitement that 42 enthusiastic U4 students arrived at Buxton Station at the beginning of June to embark on their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award expedition. Laden with rucksacks and kit nearly as big as themselves, each group set off to follow individually planned routes, and navigate their way, unaccompanied, through 15km of Peak District countryside to reach the campsite.

Their navigation skills were well and truly put to the test. As is often the case at Bronze level, a few wrong turns were taken along the way but, impressively, each group managed to identify their errors and successfully find their way back on course. The ability to problem solve under pressure and to work together calmly in unfamiliar surroundings is one of the key aims of the expedition, and our students rose to the challenge.

The weather over the course of the expedition was generally fine, (always a welcome bonus) and everyone approached the

challenge with determination, positivity, and no small amount of humour.

We look forward to seeing many of them take the next step on their DofE journey with the Silver Award in L5.

Silver DofE Expedition - Rising to the Challenge

Our Silver Award students took on their challenge in the stunning but demanding landscapes of the Hope Valley. Over the course of three days and two nights, the groups navigated their way from Chinley train station to Hathersage, camping at Upper Booth and Castleton along the way.

Unlike their younger counterparts, the Silver teams had to contend with a very different challenge: heat. It was blisteringly hot each day, with little respite from the sun, and the terrain made for some tough going. The ascent of Mam Tor proved particularly difficult but the teams showed remarkable endurance and spirit, sustaining both their efforts and morale throughout.



Their hard work and attitude did not go unnoticed. An independent DofE Assessor, who happened to be staying at one of the same campsites, took the time to compliment the group on their excellent behaviour and teamwork; praise which we were delighted (but not surprised!) to receive.

We are delighted with the way our Silver participants rose to the challenge, we'd strongly and recommend they continue their journey to the Gold Award. Their character and effort were outstanding.

DofE Gold Expedition - A True Test of Resilience

With a mix of confidence, excitement, nerves, and a touch of trepidation, our six Upper Fifth Gold Award students arrived in Keswick to begin their expedition. Buoyed by the stretch of good weather we'd been enjoying, spirits were high, with one optimistic student even asking whether waterproofs were really necessary. Oh dear!

As the group began pitching their tents

on the first night, the clouds rolled in, the temperature dropped, and the rain began to fall. And it continued to fall for the next four days. Gone were dreams of sunny hikes and scenic picnics; in their place came soggy boots, dripping tents, and a true test of resilience and teamwork.

Their mental strength was truly put to the test on the second day, as they set off towards what was meant to be the location for their wild camp high up on the fells at Blea Tarn. The weather was horrendous. With visibility dropping to just a few feet, the rain lashing sideways, and the wind blowing hard enough to knock you sideways, we made the decision to cancel the wild camp and to escort them down off the fells. Pupil safety is always our top priority, and although the group disappointed to miss out on this part of the experience, they showed remarkable understanding, (or was that relief?).

Rather than letting the weather dampen their spirits, they completed the full route for the day, and



returned to the previous night's campsite, supporting each other with good humour and determination along the way.

As a side note, several Mountain Rescue Teams were called out that day to assist DofE groups from other schools who had become lost on the fells in the poor conditions. We were reminded, once again, of the importance of our long-standing policy: to always locate ourselves on the routes our students plot, regardless of terrain, elevation or weather. On this occasion, that policy could not have proved more valuable.

The expedition concluded on Day 4 with a summit of the mighty Helvellyn, and wouldn't you know it, the sun finally came out! I can't think of many tougher ways to finish an expedition, and it was telling that we didn't see a single other DofE group on the mountain that day. But our students rose to the challenge. The climb was

demanding, our legs were weary, but the views at the top were truly breathtaking. That moment, standing together in the sunshine, surrounded by panoramic views, made every muddy mile and damp night worthwhile.

We are incredibly proud of our Gold participants. There is a reason only a small number of young people choose to undertake this level of the Award. This was a challenging expedition by anyone's standards, and they met it with grit, good grace, and a strong sense of team spirit. Their dedication, resilience, and maturity are everything the DofE Award aims to nurture.

ST BEDE'S PROJECT WEEK

Having successfully run Project Week for two years, we are more convinced than of ever tremendous value to pupils. This four-day, problem-based learning experience encourages pupils to develop critical thinking, creativity, and project management skills while working collaboratively to solve a real-world challenge. **Taking** ownership of their learning journey helps pupils to build resilience and apply their knowledge in practical, meaningful ways. Teamwork during Week also enhances Project communication skills, while the approach fosters dynamic enthusiasm and makes learning both engaging and relevant.

We were determined to make Project Week even better for 2025, sothis year saw the addition of a trip on the first day of the project. This gave pupils valuable hands-on experience of what their project was going to be about. Pupils then returned to College on Tuesday to reflect on what they had learned, carry out further research, and plan and execute their project.

The Upper Third project this year focused on animal welfare and sustainability. Pupils visited Chester Zoo and took part in two bespoke workshops focusing conservation and how the zoo habitats mimics natural and promotes natural behaviours. They planned their then own sustainability project to be implemented St Bede's. at considering cost, impact, and even designing a mascot for the project. The range of ideas was incredible, with pupils exploring everything from reducing the impact of Coltan Chromebooks to protecting flamingos and other innovative solutions.

The Lower Fourth project centred around business and sales, with pupils visiting the Trafford Centre to conduct market research before returning to the College to open their own version of St Bede's Café. As well as designing everything from the menu and loyalty cards to promotional posters and job adverts, pupils used an online simulation tool to run their café. They had to quickly



get to grips with staffing, sales, pricing and managing orders — discovering that balancing a budget sheet was more difficult than it first appeared!

The Upper Fourth project focused on the rich heritage and culture of Manchester. Pupils visited four sites in the city centre to explore and learn about the area's unique history. Back at College, they designed their own walking tours and created podcasts to guide tourists around their chosen attractions. The depth of information and backstories pupils uncovered — and the highengaging wav quality, presented them — was brilliant to hear. Winning podcasts are being played at lunchtimes this week for all pupils to enjoy.

Lower Fifth pupils visited Manchester City's Media Centre, sitting in the room where press conferences are held, and taking part in workshops on how to launch a successful media campaign. Back in

College, it wasn't football but the College's 150th anniversary that became the focus of their work. Pupils designed, directed and produced three videos of varying lengths to market the College on social media. The quality of the material blew the judges away, with pupils involved in every part of the creative process. The best videos are now being played on screens around the College.

Thursday saw form group, year group and finally whole College finals, with the overall winners announced in Celebration Assembly on the final day of the academic year. Feedback from both pupils and staff has been overwhelmingly positive, confirming just how valuable the four days are. Oxbridge admissions this week echoed this, emphasising that it's not just what someone knows, but how they approach a problem that truly counts.

Alongisde their reading, they have had some fantatsic conversations about books, the power of words, and the complexities of various topics, characters and moments in the texts.

It has been a fantastic opportunity for pupils to read a range of books and be given the opportunity to engage in discussions around their opinions and interpretations. Students have been attending biweekly sessions in the library to discuss the books as a group and have found the experience incredibly rewarding.

The Carnegie Medal for Writing is awarded by children's librarians for an outstanding book written in English for children and young people. A national (and international) reading for pleasure initiative, the Carnegie Shadowing Scheme engages thousands of children and young people in reading the books on the shortlist via reading groups in schools.

Students reflected:

'In my opinion, the process was actually really fun. I liked the meetings, I thought they were all really chilled and there wasn't any pressure. I thought hearing everyone's opinions about different books was really interesting, because different people read different books in completely different contexts and take different



things from the same text. I would definitely recommend this to people next year; I had a really good time and I think more people should definitely get involved.'

'I absolutely loved the Carnegie Shadowing experience. It allowed me to be more motivated to read and try books that weren't necessarily in my comfort zone - which I think is a really good thing as it lets you challenge your beliefs and what you stand for. The library lessons allowed me to reflect on my reading experience and how I felt about the books I read which I enjoyed.'

'I think the shadowing was very worth it; I enjoyed reading books and having discussions about them, even if not all of the books were good. I will 100% recommend it to Upper Fourth next year because (especially if you like reading) it is an amazing experience and

opportunity. If you get a chance, do it!'

Thursday 19th On June, the shadowing pupils got the opportunity to watch a livestream of the awards in the Maher Library and see the announcement of 'King of Nothing' by Nathaniel Lessore be announced as the Shadower's Choice winner (we voted for this one to win as a group too!) and Glasgow Boys by Margaret McDonald be announced as the Judges Award winner.

We are so proud of the pupils who took part in this scheme, they really pushed themselves academically and showed fantatsic commitment to the awards, taking the process seriously and discussing a variety of topics with maturity and sensitivity. Well done!

CHASING DREAMS:

A YOUNG FOOTBALLER BALANCING BOOKS AND THE BEAUTIFUL GAME

For many young athletes, football is more than a passion, it's a way of life. For one rising talent, David, a Lower Fifth pupil at St Bede's and academy player at Manchester City FC, the journey began with a family deeply rooted in the love of the game.

"I have a family who loves the sport, and both my older brothers played football at a high level, so they definitely inspired me. Football highlights and games were always playing in my house. That environment really shaped me, and as I grew, I just fell deeper in love with the game."

That passion, nurtured at home, has already taken him to remarkable heights, including wearing the England jersey at youth level last month.

"When I found out I was selected, it felt surreal," he says. "It had been a goal of mine for a long time, and I was just over the moon. I felt proud of myself."

Balancing football with education is a challenge few outsiders fully understand, especially for someone juggling training schedules and national team duties with schoolwork. But David works diligently to keep the balance.

"It isn't easy," he admits. "But I know I need to stay on track educationally to stay in this position. All my life I've been taught that education is key. Every opportunity I have to study, I try to use it effectively." While David was away with England in May, he achieved the highest possible grade for his attitude to learning in his education reports. He was 'outstanding' throughout and we are extremely proud of his academic and sporting achievements.

A typical day during England camp involves a carefully structured schedule: "Wake up, get ready, breakfast, and then a 1 - 4 hour education session depending on what I've already done that week. After that, it's a short football session, usually about an hour and a half. Then dinner, recovery, such as meditation and mobility, and then bed. It's pretty similar at Manchester City and St Bede's, just with longer days."



Still, the payoff makes the long hours worthwhile. Putting on the England jersey was an unforgettable moment.

"It was crazy," he recalls. "The realisation that I'm actually playing for England was overwhelming. I was just excited and ready to express myself on the pitch. It gave me this sense that all the hard work, my parents' sacrifices, and my family's support was finally starting to pay off."

One moment stands out above the rest.

"Receiving my first England cap and jersey — I'll never forget it. All the coaches and players were in the room, and when my name got called, screaming everyone was clapping. The atmosphere was filled with genuine happiness and everyone was chanting my name! It was a moment that I'll remember for the rest of my life. What made it even better was seeing that same energy given to the other players making their debuts too."

But behind the highs, there are also real challenges, especially in managing time and responsibilities.

"Getting the perfect balance is probably the hardest part," he says. "It's a job in itself just to complete homework while doing a five-day-aweek football programme. There were times I'd go to bed late and wake up late, and it would throw off my whole day."

Despite the pressure, the experience has taught him valuable lessons, not just about football, but about himself.

"I've learned that I could be really good. There's always room to improve, but this journey has given me extra confidence, especially in a season full of ups and downs."

Teamwork, he says, has played a major role in keeping everything balanced.

"It's so important. Having those teamworking skills makes everything easier, it saves time, avoids wasted opportunities, and builds a strong, safe environment. On the pitch, it creates chemistry. Off the pitch, it builds understanding and support."

Looking ahead, his goals are as ambitious as his drive.

"Academically, I want to pass my GCSEs and A levels with flying colours. I want to be the best youth player in the world and play professional football very, very soon. I want to represent England at senior level and possibly also Ireland, where I was born. Even Nigeria, if that opportunity ever comes."

SUCCESS IN THE ANTHEA BELL PRIZE FOR YOUNG TRANSLATORS

Earlier this year, French pupils from Upper Third, Lower Fourth, and Upper Fourth proudly represented their Houses (Bosco, Campion, Magdalene, and Siena) in the prestigious Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators, a national competition organised by the Queen's College Translation Exchange.

The competition challenges young linguists across the UK to immerse themselves in the world of literary translation. The Upper Third took on the vibrant poem La Tour Eiffel by Maurice Carême, while the Lower Fourth and Upper Fourth worked on the delicate and evocative Les Colombes by Théophile Gautier. Though they were given a glossary of vocabulary, the real task lay in capturing the poems' rhythm, emotion, and subtle nuances and recreating them naturally and poetically in English.

We are delighted to share that all of our Upper Third French teams were awarded a Commendation by the judges. This is a fantastic achievement, particularly in a competition that received over 22,000 entries, with nearly 5,000 being formally judged. The standard was incredibly high this year, making our pupils' success all the more impressive.

We are so proud of the creativity, care, and collaboration shown by all who took part. Translating poetry is no easy feat, and their commendation reflects both their language skill and their literary sensitivity.

We hope this experience inspires even more pupils to embrace the beauty and challenge of Modern Foreign Languages throughout their time at school and beyond.

Hopes were high for the Athletics team as they had been successful in a much smaller competition; however, all the largest schools in Manchester would be there this time.

The track events were up first, and leading the team off was Sara in the 75m. After four heats, she was declared the runner-up in the event, to a Wright Robinson student, clocking a little over 10.5 seconds. Next up, Ruby had a difficult lane draw in the 150m but performed well to finish 4th overall and score valuable points for the team. Last on the track was Myla, who was running the 800m, a day after being off school with illness. Somehow, she managed to find the strength to complete both laps and, after executing a fantastic race plan, closed in on the eventual winner in the final straight to finish second.

St Bede's had enjoyed a very successful track programme, but as points are awarded for every finishing position, starting with twenty-five for a win, it was difficult to know how we compared to the other schools. Next up was the turn of the field events, with Mayowa and Enya taking part in Shot Put and Javelin, both being new to the events. They performed admirably and only missed out on a medal by a matter of centimetres, with them both finishing 5th out of the 16 competitors. There was some expectation on Kimmy's shoulders in the Long

Jump as she had recorded a distance over 4m the week before, but she handled the pressure well to win the event by 25cm, jumping 4.10m. Meanwhile, in the time-consuming High Jump competition, Deborah had not put a foot wrong in the early rounds and so was one of only a few pupils still in as the bar reached 1.25m. A superb clearance on her first attempt that could not be matched by anyone else resulted in a further gold medal for St Bede's.

This left the all-important 4x100m relay to determine which school would be crowned Manchester champions. Fresh from her High Jump victory, Deborah joined Kimmy, Ruby and Sara on the track in heat three. Changeovers are key to the success with the relay, and the last minute practice on the sidelines paid off as the girls won their heat and were the third fastest school overall. They could do no more and had to agonisingly wait for the scores to be announced from 16th to 1st. With numerous schools named after saints, the delay from the announcer after the "St". was created tension for the teams. However, we did not need to worry as it was only after we knew the position of all the other schools that the name St Bede's was called out as Champions. The U3 team should be so proud of their achievement, and of how they conducted themsleves on the afternoon, supporting one another. I know I certainly was!

GARDENERS FOR THE DAY

On 3 July, Heads of House gave Lower Sixth the opportunity to participate in a morning of gardening at the Caritas Lalley Allotment and Community Pantry in North Manchester. The allotment is an entirely charitable organisation and works with vulnerable people across Manchester to provide sustainably grown food to those who need it most.

Students donned gardening gloves and split into groups to water the plants (tomatoes, cucumbers, basil, lettuce) in the polytunnels, and to clear overgrown shrub areas to create paths around the vegetables. They were taught about how much food we waste (a third of all global food) and learned about using food waste to create compost. They were shown a new compost machine (the only one like it in Manchester), to which the school next door donates food after lunch each day. Excitingly, the students got to harvest some vegetables - rocket, cauliflower, courgettes, lettuce, basil, cucumbers and swiss chard. When they weighed the vegetables they had harvested, they totalled more than 10kg! Many thanks to Mr Parkes, Ms Singleton and Ms Smith for accompanying the Lower Sixth.



INAUGURAL TED TALKS COMPETITION:

EMPOWERING VOICES, INSPIRING IDEAS

The winner of the competition was revealed during our Celebration Assembly on the final day of term: Molly G came first with her intriguing presentation on 'A Criminal Investigation', while special commendations were awarded to Shriya N and Yoshi Y for their wonderful talks on 'Perspective' and 'Time Travelling' respectively.

We look forward to seeing this event grow in the years to come and to hearing more Bedian voices sharing ideas worth spreading




ALUMNI VISIT






SIXTH FORMERS AT DELTA FORCE PAINTBALL
