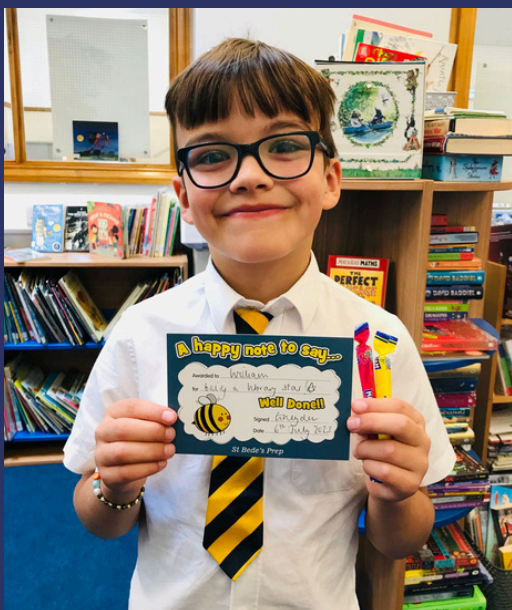




Prep Library Prizes

U4 Business Summer Fair

On Tuesday 20th June, Upper Fourth Business students completed their final Enterprise activity by hosting a Summer Fair for the College. This Fair showcased their collaborative and creative skills by tasking each group to design, promote and manage a Business stall idea. Understanding their target market well, that being the other students in the College, many groups focused on providing nourishment and refreshments, although some chose more entertaining game activities. These had the added bonus of keeping their audience in the Joseph Refectory for longer, which meant they were more likely to purchase from other stalls.

Students had to source and fund their own materials and packaging, thanks for which should be extended to parents, all in the hope of securing the biggest profit possible. During the afternoon, fierce competition took place between multiple milkshake sellers and lollipop vendors impacting pricing strategies. Certain groups also cursed their supply chains as they could not keep up with unprecedented demand with many running out of stock, missing the opportunity to maximise revenue.

Overall the students raised £431.79 revenue in just over an hour with a total profit of £256.03, some of which will be retained to fund next year's students and a minimum of 10% will go to charity. Each group then decided what happened to the remainder, with some choosing to opt for various profit sharing schemes.

As ever in the world of Business, not everyone is successful with a few groups failing to break-even. However, all involved learned a great deal about how to manage a small business, enhancing their entrepreneurial skills greatly. All the Upper Fourth Business students who took part should be commended for their attitude and professionalism with the Fair, with particular mention to the following students who not only made the most revenue but also the most profit overall. U4 Business trip to Blackpool

Following their studies of 'Thinking like an Entrepreneur', 'Adapting like an Entrepreneur' and 'Behaving like an Entrepreneur', almost 50 U4 Business students recently paid a visit to Blackpool Pleasure Beach to discover how they adapt in an increasingly competitive market, and more particularly how they use the 4P's of Marketing (Product, Price, Promotion and Place) to continually engage with, and attract, new and existing customers.

They also looked at how developments in technology have helped the Pleasure Beach to meet their customer's ever evolving needs and wants. They received a talk from Pleasure Beach staff which explained how the development of their most recent addition 'Icon' fitted into their overall strategy and the impact it had had on the Pleasure Beach's fortunes. It gave the students a hands on opportunity to see how the theory related to real life business practices. After the presentation and questions the students then put the customer experience to the test. They had a fantastic time enjoying the rides and taste testing the ice cream!



The Student Perspective:

Blackpool Pleasure Beach is one of the most popular theme parks in England. It was created in 1896 and it is now 127 years old. As it is still popular nowadays, it shows that they have a strong marketing team to keep the theme park famous.

From the marketing talk, I have learnt about how they meet the customers' wants and the market trend. For example the rollercoaster ICON, it is the UK's first double-launch roller coaster with a speed that makes customers feel like they are Formula one drivers. The speed of this rollercoaster is their unique selling point, it attracts people to go to Blackpool Pleasure Beach to have a try on their new roller coaster.

Another thing that I learnt is that they use advertisements to get new customers, such as using social media and television advertisements. They create videos and launch them on peak time of the television advertisement to increase awareness of people and let them feel interested on the rides.

It is a remarkable experience for me to understand how a business works and how the things we learn in lessons apply in reality.

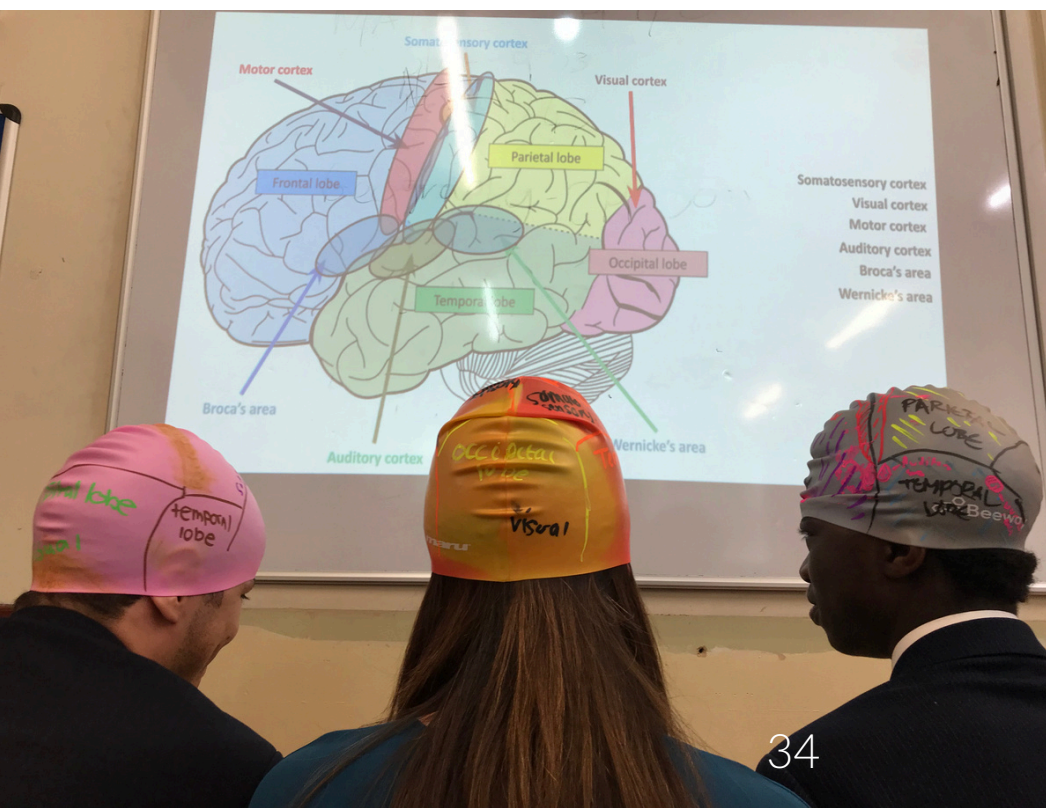
PSYCHOLOGY

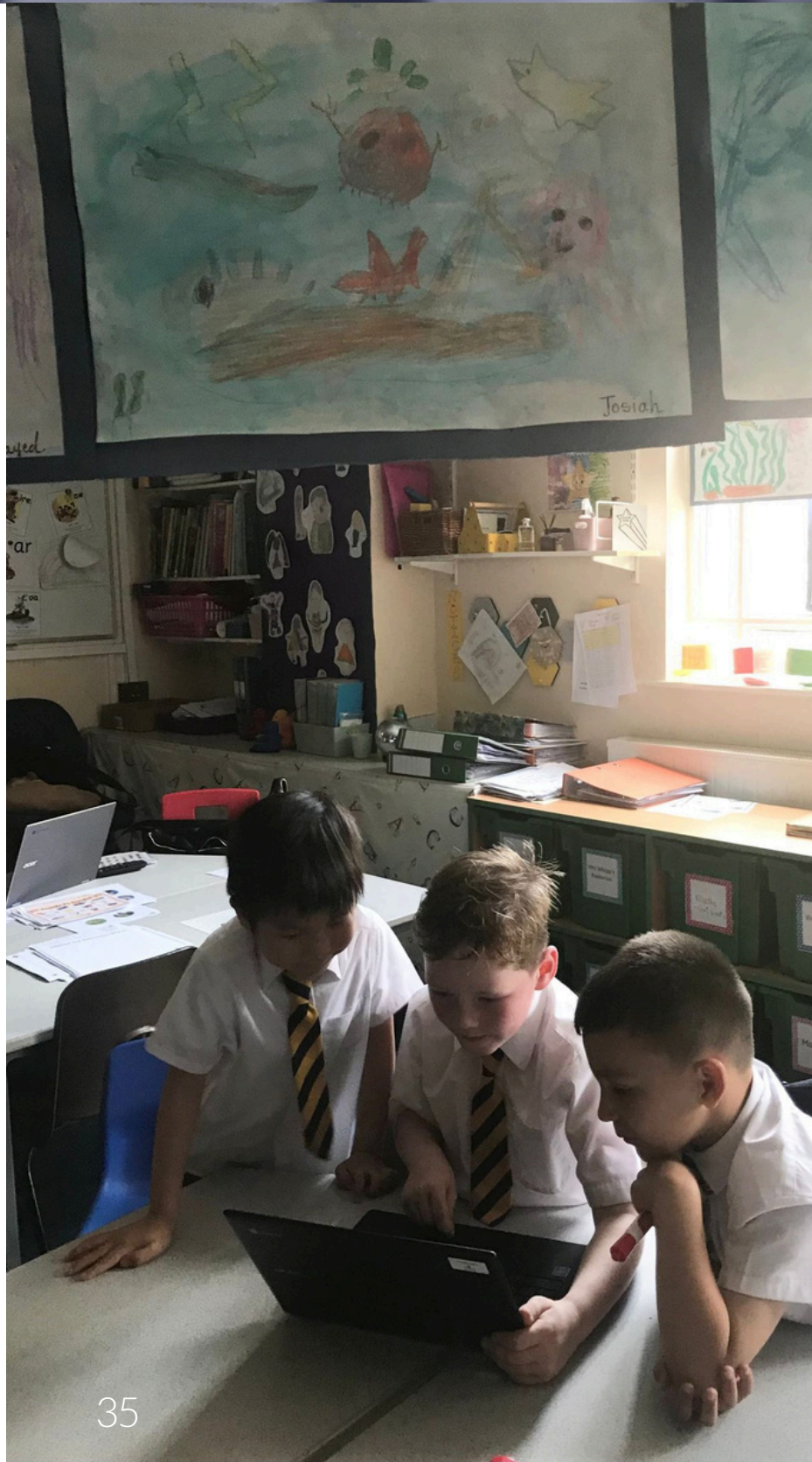

It was an opportunity for students to put their science and languages into context in a fun environment, improving their employability skills along the way. Our students conducted themselves fantastically throughout the morning and were commended by the organisers in the following areas:

Team Saturn, Spanish (Donnell, Ireay, Victoria, Aidan, Rida, Matilda): Hotel Design sheet - very practical and thought through, a nice original design with good detailing and labelling, solid work in the investor meeting.

A huge congratulations goes to Holly E (U4) and Aaron A (L6) for both being awarded **'Highly Commended'** for their creative writing and reading submissions to this year's Sadie Massey Awards.

Established in 2015, the Portico Sadie Massey Awards aims to encourage a life-long love of reading and writing in young people from all backgrounds. The Portico Library itself was established in 1806 and many members wrote influential books, such as our first Secretary Peter Mark Roget, who wrote the first English thesaurus, and founder of atomic theory, John Dalton. Celebrated Manchester author Elizabeth Gaskell also used the Library while her husband William acted as its longest-serving Chair. The Awards are named after Glasgow-born **Sadie Massey and her desire to spread a love of reading and writing**. While living in Manchester, Sadie and her husband Alex began helping disadvantaged children through various charities. This desire to give opportunities to all young people is continued through the Portico Sadie Massey Awards.

The awards cover both reading and writing - **students had the opportunity to enter book reviews as well as pieces of original writing** that focused on the setting of the North of England. Holly's review of 'Circe' by Madeline Miller and Aaron's short story titled 'Journey to School' were shortlisted by the judging panel and on Thursday 15th June they received their certificates at an exclusive awards event hosted at the Portico Library. The awards ceremony featured readings from the children's author Livi Michael, as well as poet Dom Conlon.

As a previous winner myself of the Sadie Massey Award, it was wonderful to see our own students take part and be celebrated for their achievements, as well as continue the legacy of Sadie Massey. Another massive congratulations to Holly and Aaron for this fantastic achievement, as well as to all our other pupils who entered the competition this year - **they have shown true Bedian spirit** and produced some fantastic pieces of writing!

I Must Betray You

Holly

I Must Betray You is a defiantly truthful historical fiction novel uncovering the suffering, desperation, and fear of the Romanian people under the 42- year- long Communist dictatorship they faced under Nicolae Ceausescu and his wife Elena.

The plot focuses on a seventeen-year-old boy named Cristian who is forcefully recruited as an informer- a civilian forced to spy on targets and report back to the Securitate, the secret police agency of the Socialist Republic of Romania. He is blackmailed into this role and spends the entirety of the story grappling with the consequences of this manipulation as he is forced to carry out missions. However, he secretly dreams of freedom for his country and is determined to fight back against the oppressive communist regime. He watches everyone he knows and loves to be torn apart by the unending suspicion and poverty caused by the government's growing list of human rights violations. Each page of the story is laced with paranoia; characters seem one-sided in their motivations until more about them is revealed, and your entire perception of them is turned upside- down. Ruta Sepetys does not shy away from depicting the violence, torment, and torture (both mental and to an extent, the physical) that 23 million Romanians faced under their oppressive government.

Interestingly, the author decided to leave several questions unanswered at the end of the story, to show how many communist Romanian documents and some of the Securitate's files were destroyed in the more than 15- year period where the records were withheld from the Romanian public.

In summary, this novel is an equally terrifying and hopeful fictional account of the brutalities and horrific truths of living under a Communist dictatorship in the 1980s. Each page induces a feeling of uncertainty and suspicion unlike any other book | have ever read, whilst shedding light on a country's important history that many people are still unaware of. 5/5, an incredibly poignant but hopeful read.

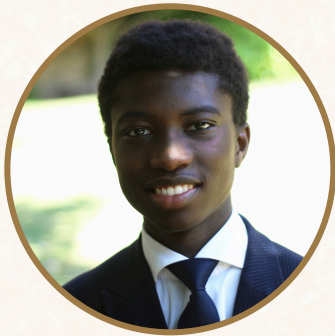
