It is also our second year of specialist science teaching, focused on inquiryand working based learning scientifically. This specialist teaching is truly setting us apart from other Prep schools. # THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD - OPPORTUNITIES AT BRONZE, SILVER AND GOLD

We are delighted to share that our school continues to offer students the opportunity to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh's (DofE) Award. This internationally recognised programme provides young people with the chance to develop resilience, independence, and valuable life skills through a series of challenges designed to inspire growth both personally and socially.

#### Bronze Award (Year 9 and above)

The Bronze Award is the first stage and is open to students aged 14 and above. Participants undertake four sections:

- **Volunteering** making a positive contribution to the community.
- **Physical** committing to a sport or physical activity.
- **Skills** developing personal talents and interests.

 Expedition - planning, preparing for, and completing a two-day outdoor journey as part of a team.

#### A Bronze participant said:

"Taking part in the Bronze DofE Award was one of the best experiences I've had at school. I learned how to work as part of a team, gained more confidence in myself, and discovered that I could achieve more than I thought. The expedition was a challenge, but also so rewarding – I'll never forget it."

#### Silver Award (Year 10 and above)

Students who complete Bronze may progress to Silver, or choose to begin their DofE journey at this level. Requirements are more challenging, including a longer expedition and extended time commitments across the sections. This award builds on the foundations of Bronze, encouraging participants to deepen their skills, broaden their experiences, and take greater responsibility.



#### A Silver participant reflected:

"Silver pushed me further than I expected. The expedition was longer and more demanding, but it taught me how to stay positive and support others when things got tough. I also developed a skill I now really enjoy and continue to use outside school. It felt like a real step up from Bronze."

#### Gold Award (Year 11 and beyond)

At the highest level, the Gold Award reauires sustained commitment, leadership and resilience. Alongside Volunteering, Physical, Skills, and Expedition, participants complete a Residential section, spending time away from home with new people in an unfamiliar setting. Achieving Gold is a truly prestigious accomplishment and is highly valued by universities, employers, and future career pathways.

#### A Gold participant shared:

"The Gold Award was life-changing. The Residential gave me the confidence to meet new people, and the longer expedition tested every part of my determination. Completing Gold showed me that with persistence and teamwork, I can achieve anything. It has already made a difference in my university applications."

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award not only equips students with practical abilities but also nurtures qualities such as commitment, teamwork and perseverance. These experiences enrich personal development and stand out on applications for further education and employment.

We warmly encourage families to support their children in taking part at Bronze, Silver or Gold level.




## **JESSICA'S ROWING SUCCESS**

### SIXTH FORM WELCOME DAY

As part of their first day, our new Lower Sixth students took part in a series of introductory sessions on the Bedian Research Project (BRP), Voices of Change, the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), and our new Level 3 certificates in both Core Maths and Sustainability.

Through the BRP, Sixth Formers engage with a range of short courses designed to prepare them for life beyond school. These sessions equip students with practical skills such as time management, effective notetaking, and independent research, while also encouraging personal growth through a course Emotional Intelligence. particularly inspiring element of the programme is the Oxford Character Project, and students also prepare TED-Ed and deliver Talk presentations, enabling them to share their ideas with clarity and conviction. The EPQ, a qualification highly regarded by universities,

offers students the chance to investigate a topic of personal interest in depth. It helps sharpen the critical thinking skills essential for Alevel study.

The included day also UCAS, where introduction to students were guided through the university application process and reassured of the support available in choosing a pathway and preparing strong personal statements. A lively Q&A with members of the Upper Sixth gave the new cohort a chance to ask questions and to get to know those with whom they will share the Common Room. The day concluded with team-building games and activities, ensuring that all of our Lower Sixth—including those joining us from other schools and countriesquickly felt part of the community.



# NEW OFFERINGS IN THE SIXTH FORM

This year, the Sixth Form introduces a number of new qualifications which students can take alongside their three or four A levels. Students may choose between the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) or one of two new courses: Core Maths and Sustainability.

The brand-new Level 3 Certificate in Sustainability explores the key principles of sustainability while encouraging students to develop positive, practical solutions to the challenges urgent governments, organisations, and individuals today. This course is particularly relevant for those considering careers in environmental conservation or degree programmes where sustainability modules are increasingly common. It will be graded Pass, Merit, Distinction, and Distinction\*, and is expected to carry up to 28 UCAS tariff points.

Core Maths is designed for students who are not taking A level Mathematics but who wish to strengthen their mathematical skills to support other subjects, future study, or employment. With its emphasis on practical, real-world applications, Core Maths is especially useful for those pursuing courses or careers where mathematical skills are valuable but not the primary focus. The qualification is worth up to 20 UCAS points and is graded A to E.

Finally, Voices of Change is an exciting new weekly course that invites students to reflect on big ideas in philosophy, ethics, justice, and the Catholic faith. Delivered in a relaxed, discussion-based format, it provides a safe and respectful environment for students to share perspectives, question assumptions, and refine their ability to think critically and communicate effectively. unique programme equips students the skills engage thoughtfully with some of the world's most important questions and to articulate their beliefs with clarity, confidence, and compassion.



# FATHER ALVARO'S SEPTEMBER MESSAGE

Welcome to a new year at St Bede's College. A new year that is anything but just another year. We are starting the academic year in which we will begin our 150th anniversary celebrations.

We opened with the traditional College Mass of the Holy Spirit, celebrated in the Sports Hall. This is a long-standing tradition in educational institutions, where the community begins the year by entrusting itself to the intercession and guidance of the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit is the third Person of the Trinity or, as I told the students at the opening Mass, the One you turn to when, in the panic of exams, you rush to the chapel seeking peace and light. Have a good start to the year!




